PP&L Slates \$40 Million for 1966 Electric Projects

Electric system expansions and modernizations to help supply the increasing amounts of energy being used by customers will require Pacific Power & Light Company to expend nearly \$40-million for facilities next year.

"About half of the construction budget for 1966 will be for distribution system work such as larger-capacity substations and power lines as well as service extensions to serve the new residential, commercial and industrial customers that will establish themselves in the region," it was reported by PP&L's district manager, Wayne Goin.

The Pacific Power manager noted that despite moderate temperatures most of the 1965 heating season, average home use of electricity edged upward more than 250 kilowatt hours for the year. Several divisions recorded an average household usage in 1965 of more than 11,500 kilowatt hours.

"Popularity of new electric living conveniences and growing preference for electric heat in new residential units indicate usage will continue to increase as in the past," the PP&L manager added.

New transmission circuits, including a 50-mile link of the Northwest-Southwest regional high-voltage intertie circuit between Oregon and California, will require the outlay of about \$13-million, and the power facilities, including a new Keno dam on the upper Klamath River, will require \$4,350,000 of the total electric construction work.

Other utility services which PP&L supplies in certain areas such as telephone, central steam heat and water, and special research and development work will call upon the company to expend another \$4,647,000, it was reported.
