## 102-Yr.-Old Area Pioneer Passes Away

Thomas Lincoln Henness, who was born 102 years ago between Stayton and Mehana, died Sunday in a Portland hospital following a 17-day illness. He had lived at Beaverton the last five years.

A former insurance man and farmer, Henness' interest in life and his mental alertness never waned despite his years, the family said. A life-long Republican, he was honored guest in 1964 at the GOP Lincoln Day Dinner at Portland when Sen. Barry Goldwater spoke. "I'm going to live until fall — my vote is needed," he told Goldwater. He had voted Republican in every presidential election since 1884.

**Olympics Fan**  
During the Olympics in Tokyo, Henness camped by his radio, memorized the placings and scores of the athletes and kept his family and fellow residents of Northwest Christian Home apprised of the progress of the games.

He was born July 5, 1863, on the donation land claim settled by his parents, who crossed the plains from Iowa in a covered wagon. He moved later to Gates, and spent about 40 years in Washington with the Northwestern Fire Insurance Co.

He lived in Salem about 15 years before moving to Beaverton.

**Long-Lived Family**  
He came from a long-lived family. His brother, Lewis T. Henness, a well-known resident of the Gates-Mill City area, died in 1956 at the age of 101. Another brother lived to 99.

He is survived by his widow, Alice Henness, who will be 97 next month. They had been married almost 72 years. Other survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Priscilla Wiltsey, Salem, and son, Donald D. Henness of Seattle, and seven grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

A memorial service will be held today at 2:30 p. m. at the Northwest Christian Home in Beaverton. Glaske Mortuary, Beaverton, is in charge. Burial will be in Sunset Memorial Cemetery, Beaverton.

## Simpson Timber Co. Door Plants Break Record During 1965

Simpson Timber Company door plants have produced a record 2,000,000 doors in 1965, enough to decorate at least one doorway in every new home built in America during the past 12 months.

John H. Syme, of Seattle, who supervises Simpson's door plants in Washington, Oregon and So. Carolina, said this year's production brings Simpson's total output in its 75 year history to more than 65,000,000 doors. The bulk of this production has been at McCleary, Washington, a dominant plant in Northwest door making since 1912.

Simpson emphasizes panel door production at McCleary and produces flush doors in Portland, Ore., and Varnville, S. C. Simpson is among the ten major door makers who have established the Pacific Northwest as a leading center of American door production. The sales value of 2,500,000 panel doors and 3,500,000 flush doors made annually by these companies in Washington and Oregon exceeds \$35,000,000. These plants employ 3,350 people in the two states.

Syme said industry statistics reveal Northwest plants now supply over half of the panel doors and about 15 percent of the flush doors used annually in U. S. home building. Fine-grained Douglas fir and Western Hemlock are a prime material source for
