Below are excerpts from a letter which was dated January 18:

"We went to London for the holidays and back by way of York, Coventry, Nottingham, Stratford, Oxford and miles of winding narrow roads in between. Except for the times we became lost in London we enjoyed it very much.

"Our lives here have been far busier than we expected. I haven't even had time to finish knitting a sweater for David that I started at Thanksgiving time.

"Shopping here is very time consuming and laundry is a real chore. I do quite a bit of hand laundering and then once a week we pack soiled clothes in a suit case and take them to a launderette—by bus.

"We still cringe with cold, but have never been so healthy, now that the National Health plan provides free care.

"Our windows in the bedrooms are laced with ice and when we comb our hair, we hold our breath so the mirrors don't steam up.

"Dick is enjoying his classes at New College. He has some extremely inspiring professors and he is able to choose some outstanding classes.

"The children all enjoy school very much and through them we have made some lovely friends outside the church people."

In closing their letter the Coles said they would be off on a skiing trip to Austria in March (Liz reluctantly) and have a tour of the Holy land planned for April.

Leila Barney is Homemaker of Tomorrow Here

Leila F. Barney is this year's Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Santiam high school. She scored highest here in a written knowledge and attitude examination taken December 7. She is now eligible for state and national scholarship awards ranging from \$500 to \$5,000. Leila is a senior and a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Clark.

More than 570,000 senior girls in 14,714 of the nation's high schools were enrolled for the examination.

Test papers of all school winners in the state are being judged competitively. From them, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named. She will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search. In addition, her school will be awarded a set of the Britannica, Inc. The second-ranking girl will receive a \$500 educational grant.

Following her selection, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow, together with a school advisor, will join winners and advisors from each of the 49 other states and the District of Columbia in an expense-paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C. Climax of the trip will be the naming of the 1966 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Chosen from the state winners on the basis of her original test score, plus personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will receive a scholarship increased to \$5,000. Grants of second, third- and fourth-ranking girls in the nation will be raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and 2,000, respectively.
