Health Insurance Cards Mailed to Senior Citizens

Health insurance cards have now been mailed to over 15 million people 65 and older who have established their entitlement to hospital and medical insurance under the Social Security Act, according to Clair Flaten, Social Security District Manager in Salem. The large mailing of the red, white, and blue cards was early in June.

Cards for people who did not sign up for the voluntary medical insurance part of the program — which requires a monthly premium payment of \$3 — were first mailed in June. This mailing is being delayed since many among the 1,000,000 people who did not enroll for medical benefits initially have since changed their decisions, and Congress has extended the enrollment period to May 31.

Flaten warned that some older people may not receive cards before the health insurance program starts in July because they have not yet provided necessary evidence of age or other information needed to put them on the medicare rolls. He urged any persons 65 or older who have not supplied the necessary information requested by their social security office to do so promptly. The social security office will be glad to help anyone having difficulty in obtaining the requested information.

U. S. National To Have Versatile Credit Card

U. S. National Bank of Oregon will have a highly versatile credit card within the next few months, President E. J. Kolar has announced.

The statewide financial institution has signed an agreement with the BankAmerica Service Corporation and will issue a "U. S. National BankAmericard" to Oregonians who meet certain basic qualifications.

Kolar said that as the program develops, merchants handling all types of goods and services within the state eventually will be honoring the card. In addition Oregonians holding the new U. S. National credit card ultimately will be able to use their cards throughout the nation as a result of the BankAmerica Service Corporation arrangement. At present, he pointed out there are more than 55,000 business establishments in California honoring BankAmericards.

Like conventional credit cards, holders of a U. S. National BankAmericard will be able to use them for airline tickets, in restaurants, motels and hotels, for car rental, and for many other activities connected with travel and entertaining.

"Unlike the conventional card," Kolar emphasized, "U. S. National BankAmericard may be used for buying just about everything that is available for sale in Oregon, including such diverse items as apparel, building materials, jewelry and numerous other items."

Card holders also will be able to obtain cash with their credit cards from any of U. S. National's 113 statewide branches. The card holder need only to present the card, and he will receive the desired cash, within his card limit, in minutes.

The U. S. National BankAmericard als will differ from conventional credit cards in that it will offer card holders the option of paying their monthly billing in full each month without extra charge or paying lesser portions, plus a small service charge, with no advance arrangements.
