CAMP PENDLETON, Cal.—October 14—Marine Private Mark C. Kimsey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Kimsey of Mehama, Oregon, has completed four weeks of individual combat training here.

During the training period, he received more than 200 hours of instruction in guerilla warfare, the use of infantry weapons, combat patrols, and squad tactics.

His next assignment is four weeks of basic specialist training to prepare him for a specific job in the Marine Corps. Marines to be assigned to infantry units will be taught sub-specialties such as the technical operation of the machine gun, grenade launcher, or mortar. Those entering highly skilled occupational fields will receive advanced training at resident technical schools.
