Journalism Class
Visits Oregon State

The journalism class under the direction of Robert Monson visited OSU Wednesday, January 4. There were seven members of the class that went to learn more about the air pollution problem from Prof. Richard Boubel.

The journalism class is working on a contest sponsored by the Willamette Valley TB and Health Association. For the past 30 years this Association has sponsored this press project. The class has chosen to report on air pollution and each student is taking one aspect of the subject such as cause, damage, health hazards, and a solution to this problem.

Prof. Boubel told the visitors more about air pollution and how it is being worked on as OSU. He explained what inversion is and how it makes air pollution on the West Coast. Some of these were: burning, automobile exhaust, fires, and stacks from industries. He explained how the experiment center that has been set up works, and showed us the materials in these kits, such as a bucket to catch the air, metals to test what air pollution does to them, dyes to test this, and something that catches the air pollution so a test can be made to analyze what materials are contained in this air pollution.
