Others helping on the trip were Gary Peterson and Marvin Brown. Shields ReMine furnished the transportation.

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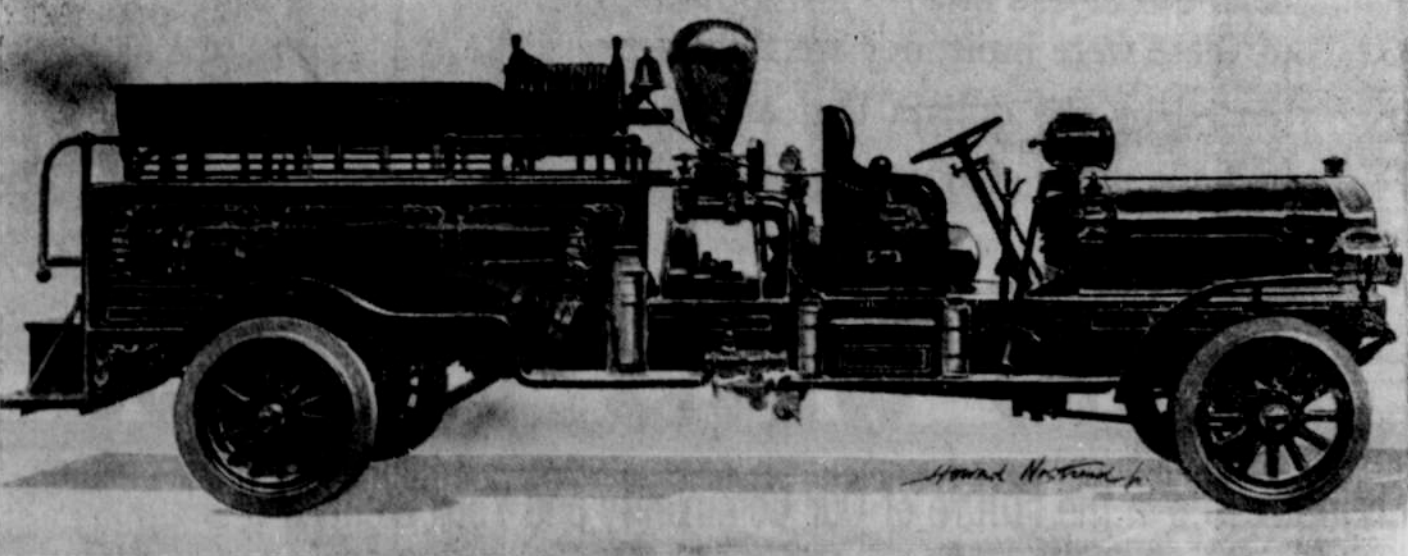
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
