

Hospital Administrator Has a Busy Schedule

Editor's Note: This is the fifth of a series of articles on Santiam Memorial Hospital written for The Enterprise by Henrietta Powell.

Describing the profession of hospital administration in two or three paragraphs is like trying to put a size 12 foot into a size 5 slipper—it can't be done. If you think of the job as "the glue that holds

everything together," you then have the right picture. A recent survey of the division of an administrator's time shows 27% spent on outside hospital activities, 23% on controlling hospital activities both inside and out, 22% on planning, new construction, remodeling, improvement in building and equipment and work flow, 12% on personal tasks, 8% on organizing hospital departments

for better efficiency, and 8% on directing the activities within the hospital. Gale M. Christensen, administrator of Santiam Memorial Hospital, judges that about 65% of his time is spent on departmental organization, efficiency and activities within the hospital, credit management, and personnel contacts, with the remaining time used wherever the demand is greatest. Like all hospital personnel, he feels his first duty is to the patient's care and comfort. The books say his major responsibility is the physical plant. He personally rates keeping the community informed of the hospital's progress, and the handling of its funds at maximum impor-
