Miss Ellen Dougherty of Portland was a weekend guest at the home of her brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Mike Fink.

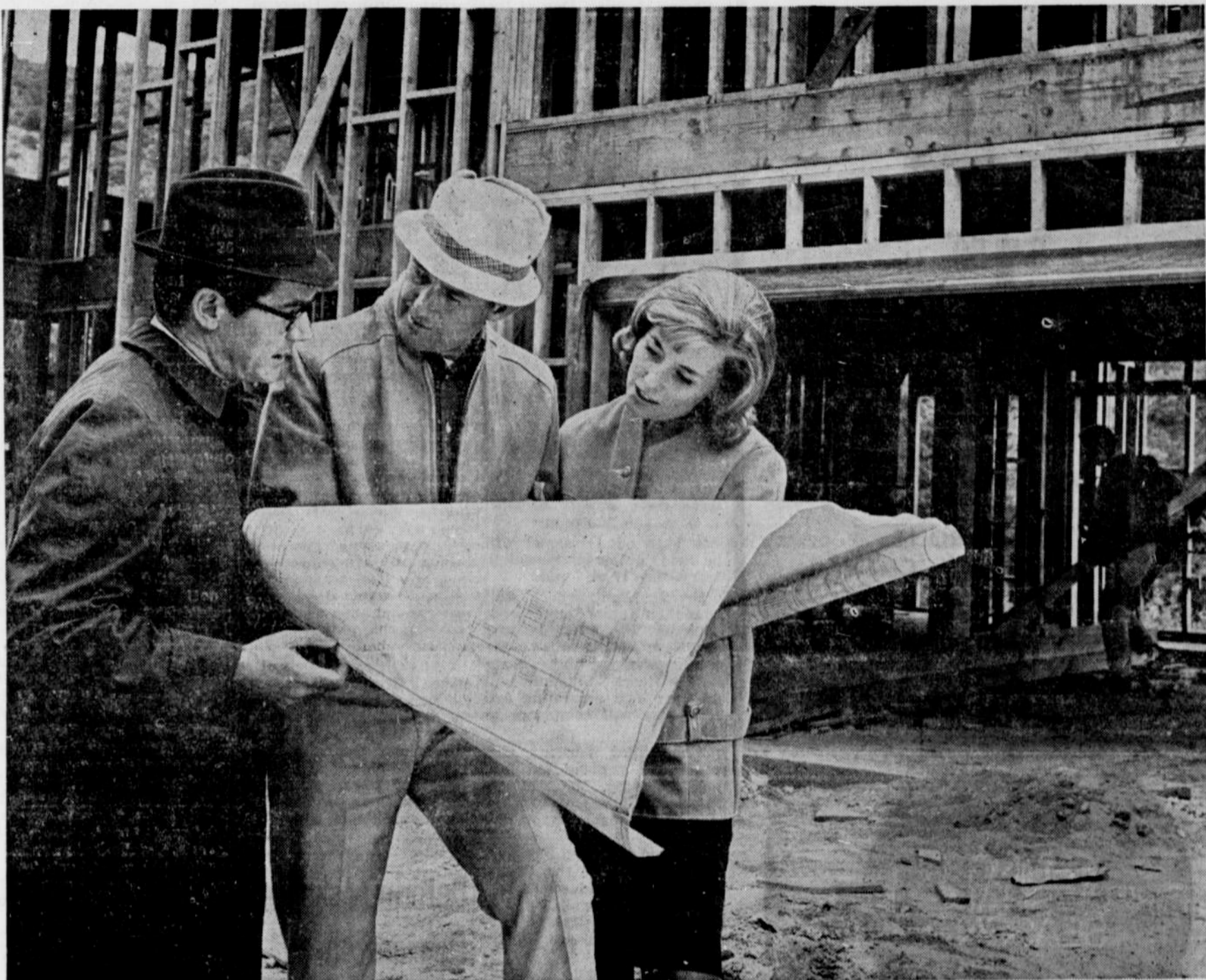
