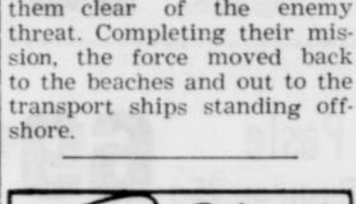
**Don Teeters Takes
Part in Maneuvers**

Fireman Apprentice Harold
D. Teeters, USN, son of Mr.
and Mrs. Donald L. Teeters of
Mehama helped to land a fully-
equipped force of Marines
on the beaches of Camp Pen-
dleton Marine Corps Base in
southern California, during a
simulated wartime amphibio-
us training exercise.

Code-named 'Alligator Hide'
his ship, the attack cargo ship
USS Union, was part of 30
ships which put 10,000 Mar-
ines ashore, using landing
craft and assault helicopters.

The exercise dealt with the
tactical situation of the fic-
titious country, "Mateo," be-
ing overrun by the nearby
country of "Horno." Under
treaty agreements, "Mateo"
requested U. S. assistance to
prevent further seizure of
territory, and to regain what
was lost.

With this objective, the
leathernecks went ashore, es-
tablished their beachhead po-
sitions, and then moved into
the "hostile" areas, sweeping
them clear of the enemy
threat. Completing their mis-
sion, the force moved back to
the beaches and out to the
transport ships standing off-
shore.
