Young & Morgan Get Timber Bids In Upper Canyon

DETROIT—Four sealed bids were submitted in the Bruno No. 3 timber sale conducted at Detroit Ranger Station Tuesday June 27th.

The sale with an estimated 3,350 mbf of Willamette National Forest timber was awarded to Young & Morgan Inc. of Mill City, for —28,716.40.

Government appraised value was \$28,630, plus road credits.

The sale located approximately 9 miles S. E. of Detroit is primarily of live timber, and involves 2,550 mbf of Douglas fir, 330 mbf of W. Hemlock and other coniferous species, 470 mbf of cedar and an un-estimated amount of pine.

The predominant Douglas fir was the only species bid on in the sealed bids. Minimum rates as advertised by the U. S. Forest Service on Douglas fir was \$34.12 per M.; W. Hemlock and other species, \$17.33 per M.; Cedar \$2.00 per M and the unestimated pine \$34.22 per M.

Highest eligible sealed bids on the Douglas fir was \$34.15 per M. Other firms submitting were Freres Venes, Lyons, Simpson Timber Co., Albany and Dana Wood Inc., Idanha.

Three sealed bids were submitted in ranger districts "Slide Creek Salvage" sale also held Tuesday morning at the same time, for an estimated 55 mbf of Douglas fir and other coniferous species. Purpose of the sale is for the cleaning up of damaged timber caused by a slide near Marion Forks.

Young & Morgan Inc.; Mill City, was awarded the contract at \$1,515.25. The U. S. Forest Service appraised value was \$1,509.75. Advertised minimum price set on the Douglas fir stand was \$27.45 per M. It sold for \$27.55 per thousand.

Other firms submitting sealed bids were Dana Wood Inc., Idanha, and Lowell O. Cree, Mill City.

Forest Recreation Report Given for Detroit District

DETROIT—According to the Willamette National Forest Recreation Report, Pamela Lake, Marion Lake, and Whitewater Roads are all open to the parking lot. Blowout and Parkert are open all of the way. Big Meadows is open but travel is not advised on the section between Fay Lake and Horn Creek Road.

High Lakes still frozen over are, Hunts, Hanks, and Blue Lakes. Other high lakes are open but there is still a considerable amount of snow above 4,500 feet especially on the North slopes the reports "says."

Independence Rock, Marion Lake, Pamela, Coffin Mountain, and Stahlman Point trails are all open, Jefferson Park Trail is open one mile.

Most trails have not yet been maintained and are still under snow, according to the report.

Whispering Falls Campground, a new Forest Service camp opened last week end, July 1st. The new camp area is located approximately 7 miles S. E. of Detroit on Highway 22 and the North Santiam River.

Construction of the campsite begun in June of last year. To-date all units have been completed. Ranger Allen Gardner said Friday, that when the campground is completed it will have a total of 43 units. He added that the entire water system has been completed and roads installed. In addition fire places, camp tables and benches are available.

L. E. Lunmark of Colton, Ore., was awarded the contract for 38,535.20. The new campground will be operated under the Land Water Conservation Charge System.

Other campgrounds (Forest Service) open are Piety, Southshore, Hoover, Whitewater, Riverside, Marion Fork and Lost Lake.

Former Niagara Resident Killed

A 14-year old Salem boy was killed and eight persons suffered apparently minor injuries when the station wagon they were in blew a tire and rolled over on the Free-

way 18 miles south of Albany Sunday evening near Harrisburg.

Dead at the scene of the 8:15 P. M. accident was David Murray Crowshaw, Jr., of 955 Garnet St., Salem. The Crowshaw family were former residents of the Niagara community.

The driver of the car was the boys brother-in-law, Norman Bruce Alexander, 40 of Junction City. Injured were Alexander's wife, Julia, 24 and sons, Norman 3, Jeffery 2, and John 3 months; John Vance, 26, Eugene, his wife Idella Vance 23 and Monica Sharp, 8, of Eugene. All were given outpatient treatment at the Albany General Hospital.

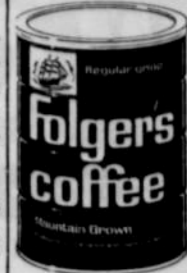
Young Crowshaw was a great nephew of Percy Budlong of Mill City and a distant relative of Charles Kelly.
