Work Smarter . . Not Harder

Scissors Are One of the Handiest Tools the family cook can have. Nothing can surpass them for some kitchen tasks, says Marie Tribble, Oregon State University Extension Nutritionist.

When you need just a little chopped parsley or green onion, snip it into bits with kitchen scissors.

Snip the fat edge of ham slices so they will lie flat. Cut bacon or dried beef into small pieces. Snip off poultry wing tips, and clip the cords around a rolled roast.

Cut off bread crusts and cut out the centers of grapefruit with kitchen scissors.

Dip scissors in warm water before snipping marshmallows, dates or candied fruit.

Cut wax paper to fit the bottom of baking pans with scissors, and clip freeze-taped wrappings on packages of frozen foods.

Buy a good quality stainless steel pair of kitchen scissors, and get the type that comes apart for cleaning and sharpening.

What Causes A Film On Glasses and dishes washed in a dishwasher?

There are two common causes. First, the water may not be really hot when it gets to the dishwasher. If the water heater is a long way from the kitchen, turn on the hot water faucet in the sink and check water temperature. Run the water until it is hot before starting the dishwasher. You may also need to set the thermostat of the water heater to a higher position.

Hard water may be your trouble. Try using more detergent. Experiment with different kinds of dishwasher detergent. In some water one kind may work better than another.

If you have hard water, use one of the rinse conditioners in the dishwasher. These products are on supermarket shelves. If your dishwasher has a dispenser for this additive, buy the liquid type. Otherwise, get the solid rinse conditioner which comes in a mesh bag. Hang this from the top rack of the dishwasher. See directions on the package.

Avoid That Bath Tub Ring, or scum on the walls or shower curtain. It's possible, if you put water conditioner in the bath tub. Even in areas of relatively soft water, a water conditioner is a help, because some minerals are always present which form scum with soap. And this is the soil you have to clean up after a tub bath.

For shower baths, use a detergent bar instead of regular soap. There are several brands on the supermarket shelf, alongside the regular bar soaps. The labels say, "leaves no scum or bath tub ring." The word "detergent" is usually not mentioned.

With warm summer months coming on, your thirst may be coming on too. The Traffic Safety Division of the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles reminds you that almost 60 per cent of last year's traffic victims had been drinking. So, whatever you decide to mix for your drink, remember this: Don't mix drinking with driving.
