Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

WHEN YOU HAVE A FIRE for outdoor cookery, why not use it for dessert, also? You can make your own combinations or prepare some baked fruits for the crowd, suggests Marie Tribble, Extension nutritionist at Oregon State University.

Apples and pears bake well on the grill or over coals. You may control the heat better on the grill but it usually takes longer for baking. Core the fruit and fill the center with sugar, cinnamon, and butter. You may want to use some raisins, nuts marshmallows, or cinnamon candies, too. Wrap the fruit in foil, twisting it tightly at the top. Bake on the hot coals about 45 minutes.

Spiced bananas are unusual and you can make them as individual servings or in a baking dish. Place peeled banana in square of foil. Split the banana in half and brush with melted butter. Sprinkle with brown sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Or mix the seasonings and sugar into the melted butter to make a paste.

Wrap each banana in foil and barbecue on the grill about 10 minutes. Have them ready to put on the coals when you start eating your first course.

A DUST FREE HOUSE. Who wouldn't relish the thought?

The new electrostatic air cleaners "sweep" 70 to 90 per cent of the dust particles, both visible and invisible, from the air. They are designed for use with central house heating and/or cooling systems and may be added to a system already installed.

People with allergies also benefit. These filters remove pollens.

IF YOUR STAINLESS STEEL PANS develop a blue cast after a number of runs through the dishwasher, don't despair.

This often happens. With silver polish you can restore

the original stainless steel finish.

HOW MUCH WATER IS ENOUGH? To be sure your house plants have the right amount of water, try this trick used by U. S. Department of Agriculture scientists in their greenhouses.

Get a funnel with a diameter about half that of the flower pot. Stick it in the soil and fill it with water. Continue to add water until the soil will take no more.

Remove the funnel by sticking your finger into the soil and capping the end so the water doesn't run out. This method gives your plants a thorough watering.

WE HEAR A LOT ABOUT HIGHWAY ACCIDENTS. But did you know that in 1966, 29,000 people were killed in home accidents in the United States?

Disabling injuries numbered 4,350,000, according to the National Safety Council. The cost, including wage loss, medical expense and administrative and claim settlement costs of insurance was a staggering \$1,400,000,000. Can we afford it?

Nearly one-fifth of the victims were children under five. Common household cleaning products often are the cause of accidental poisoning. Be sure to keep these supplies where children cannot reach them.

The Federal Hazardous Substances Labeling Act requires that poisonous products be labeled as such. It's worth taking a close look at these labels because they also tell the antidote to use in case of accidental swallowing. Speed in treatment is important.

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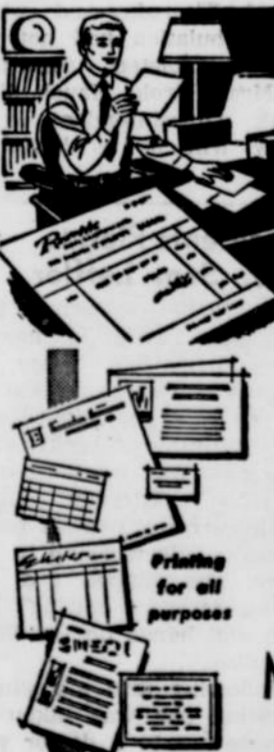


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
