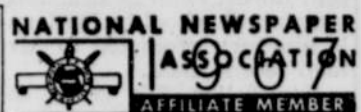

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**Zip-A-List Kits Available Now**

The Mill City-Gates residents will have an opportunity to easily put zip into their mail Postmaster Kelly reported today.

On September 21st the Post Office will deliver to every householder a kit of eight postal cards which can be mailed back to the post office with addresses needing Zip Codes. Each completed card will be sent to the post office which services the "Zip-less address and the proper code will be added before the form is returned to the sender. No postage will be needed on these cards. This project is part of Postmaster General O'Brien's program to make Zip Codes more accessible to the mailing public and thereby increase the use of the Codes in mailing addresses.

Zip Code is necessary all year around to increase the efficiency of the postal service but it is more important than ever around the holiday season. This year the post office department expects to handle over nine billion pieces of mail during the Christmas rush. Zip code will be a great help in delivering that mail accurately and on time. Zip-A-List users are reminded to print clearly and include their return address so the post office will know where to deliver the completed form. Get your lists up to date now. Don't wait until the rush is on to complete them. Extra kits will be available at the post office in Gates and Mill City.

**Paul Schiewek Returns From Trip to Alaska**

LYONS—Paul Schiewek recently returned home from Alaska, where he had spent some time assisting in the Artic Mission and encountered some of the flood at Fairbanks. He says a person almost has to see and witness it to realize the damage and ruin it caused, so many were flooded out of their homes. He was at Nenana and helped carry sand bags. He was finally evacuated to Fairbanks via Clear Park as part of the Early Warning system to Fairbanks where he spent one whole week with eighty others in a school house subject to martial law.

When leaving for Alaska he boarded the Queen Rupert at Kely Bay on Vancouver Island. On July 12 about one o'clock he spent an uneventful afternoon and night sailing out the strait and Queen Charlotte Sound, arriving at Prince Rupert B. C. There they changed portage to another boat, The Alaskan Ferry. The next several hours were very interesting, moving up through the many islands and stopping at Ketchikan, up through the Wrangell Narrows to Wrangell by small Indian fishing villages, Petersburg and Juneau. At Juneau he was permitted to visit Mendenhall Glacier, the governor's mansion, the ancient Orthodox church and the gold prospector's tunnel through a mountain.

From Juneau he flew to Anchorage where he was met by Mayor Roth, who is a representative of Artic Missions, which was his sponsor while in Alaska. From Anchorage, Mr. Roth took him to Palmer, the pioneer City of the Matanuska Immigration of 1955, and on to the Artic Training Center, 90 miles north of Anchorage, and just 8 miles south of the Matanuska Glacier. This is located in a peaceful setting between the Telkeetna and Chugach Mountain ranges, also it is this school where Shirley Erwin of Scio is serving as a missionary high school teacher.

From the Artic Training Center, Artic Missions flew him to Big Lake, out to Lake Clark, in the Alaskan Range. He also bought train fare to McKinley Park, Nenana and Fairbanks, where he attended the Alaskan Exposition.

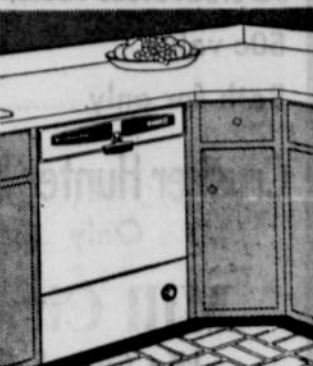
On the 21st of August he caught an evacuation plane to Anchorage, spent a day visiting the Portage Glacier and fishing on the Kenai Peninsula and caught a stage out over the Alkan highway. Mr. Schiewek said he was greatly impressed with the state of Alaska and hoped to visit there again someday.
