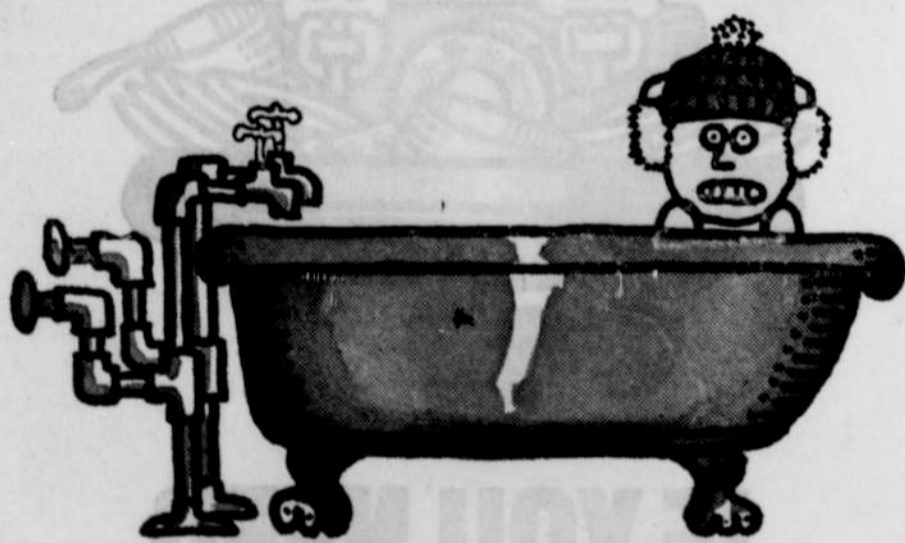

## Hunters Get Moose On Canadian Trip

DETROIT—Moose hunting in North Central Alberta, Canada, proved successful for personnel from Detroit Ranger station, and Ole Erickson and his hunting party of six.

Returning home Saturday with two cows and a calf were Ranger Lee Boeckstiegel, Glen Reinke, Vern Hallenback and Ernie Schiewek. Mr. Hallenback said the group was hunting mostly in the Lesser Slave Lake area, near Edmonton, and that a variety of weather conditions ranged from sun to snow, with coldest temperature at 20 degrees.

Ole Erickson said they ran into the Detroit Forest Service group the first time 20 miles north of a little town called Smith. Later they met in the Slave Lake area while hunting.

Mr. Erickson and his hunting party returned home just a week from the day they left. They drove 1,100 miles from Mill City. They also got two cows and a calf.

## Fish Commission Tatooes Fingerlings At Marion Forks

MARION FORKS — Howard Drago, Superintendent of the Oregon State Fish Commission Hatchery at Marion Forks reported Tuesday that the hatchery has just completed tatooeing some 25,000 Spring Chinook and approximately 23,000 steelhead, under the direction of the Army Engineers of the Walla Walla District. Ray Ollger, biologist, of the Walla Walla District was in charge of the program.

Drago said a five-girl crew began tatooeing the fish with various colors October 3. Each day some 1,000 to 2,000 tatooeed fish, were then taken, at various times through the day to Big Cliff dam where they were put through the turbine to determine what pressure would do to the fish. He said pressure of the water was varied to determine what effect it had on the fingerlings as they passed through the turbine.

The fish were caught in nets after they passed through the turbine and were examined by a pathologist to see what caused their death, if any died. Drago said the experiment was successful with only a nominal loss of fish.

The steelhead measured eight inches long and the Spring Chinook four inches, he said. He added moving pictures were taken of the complete project.

The five-girl crew on the job were Lydia Williamson, Barbara Rogers, Sue Linnland, Betty Sheldon and Billie Drago.

## Wolverines in 2nd Place in Conference

The Santiam Wolverines took over second place in the Capital Conference football race, after losing to the Central Panthers November 4, on the O.C.E. athletic field. The third ranked Panthers jumped ahead 7-0 on a pass play which was set up to be a fumble recovery on the first play of the game. The PAT was good. The second touchdown was set up when Central's quarterback Al Weaver passed to one of his split receivers, who managed to slip through Santiam's secondary, to make the score 14-0 after the PAT was made good.

The Wolverines came back after the second Panther touchdown, with a pass from Mark Bennett to Allan Yankus, who romped 51 yards to score against Central's defense. The Panthers went on to score twice more on passes and completed, both PATs to end the scoring 28-7.

Several Santiam players turned in outstanding performances in the losing effort. Monte Lalack recovered three Central fumbles, Bob Ward ran for 79 yards, and Jack Johnson and Ray Taylor each collected 10 tackles. Central will now travel to Vale for the quarter final game.

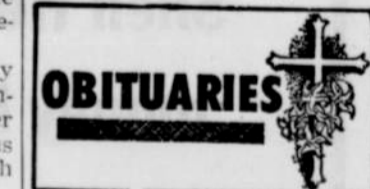
Representatives from the Mill City, Gates, Detroit, Idanha, and Marion Forks areas are urged to attend the meeting.
