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Mill City Lions Celebrate 20th Anniversary Fri.

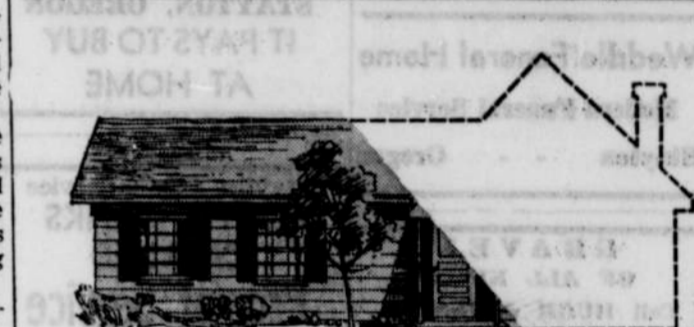
Friday night, Mill City Lions and their wives were joined by the Stayton Lions club at an anniversary party at The Riverview in Mehama.
