For Legislature



Linn County Representative William F. (Bill) Gwinn announced today his candidacy for the state legislature.

Now in his third term in the Oregon House of Representatives, Gwinn at 42 is one of the youngest committee chairmen, having served in the current term as Chairman of the House Elections committee and in addition as a member of the Rules committee and committee on Local Government. He currently represents the Speaker of the House on the Legislative Fiscal committee and was recently appointed by the Secretary of State to an advisory committee on election laws. Past legislative service has included vice chairman of Planning and Development combined with Commerce and Utilities and a member of committees on Financial Affairs, Fish and Game, Alcoholic Control and Legislative Council.

Active in numerous local affairs Gwinn is a member of Crowfoot Grange and a director of the Willamette Valley Rehabilitation Center in Lebanon. He is currently serving on the steering committee of the Upper Willamette Resource Conservation and Development project and as Chairman of the Town and Community Planning Committee. He is a director and past president of the Mid-Willamette Young Men's Christian association and currently serving as Chairman of the Tourist Promotion committee for the Linn County Chamber of Commerce. Gwinn and his wife Mardell have one son and two daughters at home and one daughter at Oregon State University.

Gwinn cites urban and rural problems, education, traffic safety, crime prevention, rehabilitation, tax reform, and the orderly and intelligent development of our soil, water, timber, recreational and human resources as matter of highest interest and concern. He stated that he would continue to consult with citizens of the county on matters of interest and would continue to insist that legislation must meet the test of fairness to all.

Danielson Files For Circuit Judge Position



Attorney Robert G. Danielson has announced his filing for the newly-created position of Circuit Judge, Position number 4, in the 21st judicial district consisting of Linn, Benton, and Lincoln Counties. This position becomes effective July 1, at which time the probate and guardianship jurisdiction of the District Court and the juvenile jurisdiction of the County Court will be transferred to the Circuit Court.

Danielson received his bachelor of science degree from Oregon State University in 1951 and his law degree from the University of Oregon in 1954. He has been in private practice since 1954 except for the period of 1959 to 1963 when he was an Assistant Attorney General in Salem. While in the Attorney General's Office he represented various state agencies including the warden of the Oregon State Penitentiary and the State Police, and also handled the probate of escheat estates. He was also involved in drafting the on-shore and off-shore oil and gas leases now used by Oregon, and in the acquisition and leasing of the land at Boardman to Boeing. Since leaving state employment he has been practicing in Sweet Home.

He is 38, married with four children aged 6, 7, 11, and 15.

If elected, Danielson pledges that he will apply his varied experience in the interests of fair and impartial application of the law for all.
