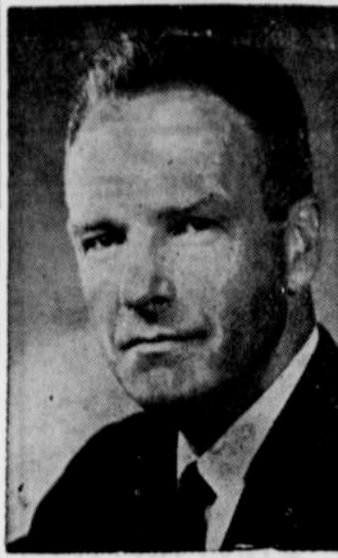
In Nebraska, like Minnesota the thunder and rain storms started quickly and left the same way.
