Anatomy Of Defeat

After a good deal of soul searching and talking with various people about the defeat of the Mari-Linn School budget, several misconceptions have been uncovered which I would like to clarify.

The actual amount being voted on is \$112,762.70. The ballot correctly states that this amount is outside the 6% limitation. This is true because this district does not have any tax base, so that

any and all money voted on is outside the 6% figure. A district does not automatically have a tax base, it needs to establish one by a vote of the people.

A second point that many people objected to was salaries under administration. People have made the statement that I was receiving a \$3,000 raise. This again is a situation where the mouth is working before the brain is in gear. The actual amount of my raise is \$400, which makes my salary for next year \$9,400. The amount of money that is shown in the budget is the salary of three people, the clerk, secretary and the principal.

A third point that has caused confusion is the result of a new law called truth in advertising. This year, for the first time schools are required to show an actual cost per thousand in dollars and cents, based on the true cash value.

Our published figure is \$9.58 per thousand of true cash value. This is not an increase of this amount, which many people feel. Actually, this is a very modest amount, but whereas before it was always stated in mills, this year it is stated in dollars and cents. Last year the true cash value was \$8.45 per thousand; this year, \$9.58, an increase of only \$1.13 per thousand of true cash value.

A final point in the defeat of our budget was the effect of the big campaign in Salem, which featured a lot of half truths and propaganda type of advertising. Some people read the notice and didn't realize it was in reference to the Salem budget, we actually had a write-in vote for Robert French, who was a candidate for the Salem school board and lives in the Keizer area.

It is the sincere desire of the school board, the budget committee and the administration to answer any and all questions pertaining to the budget. For this purpose a budget hearing was held, after being twice advertised but only one resident of the area had the interest to attend this meeting.

It would seem to me that a time honored phrase might be appropriate in reference to the budget and the budget hearing. "If you haven't tried it, don't knock it."

IT IS ORDERED that an election shall be held in the Mill City Rural Fire Protection District and within the boundaries of that area sought to be annexed to said district and that said election shall be on the 28th day of May, 1968, for the purpose of submitting the question of annexation to the voters of those areas.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the polling places for said election shall be the same as the polling places for the May 28, 1968, Oregon State primary election to be held in the precincts within the boundaries of the Mill City Rural Fire Protection District and that area sought to be annexed thereto.

Funeral arrangements have not been completed at this time.

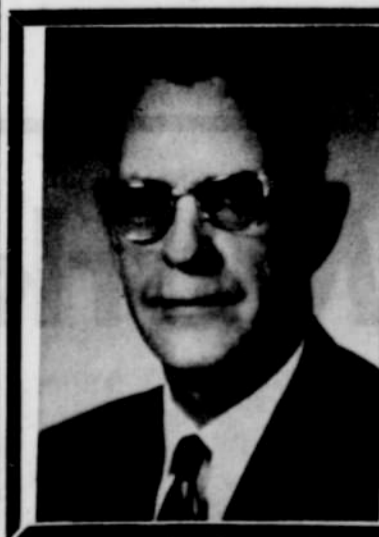
