

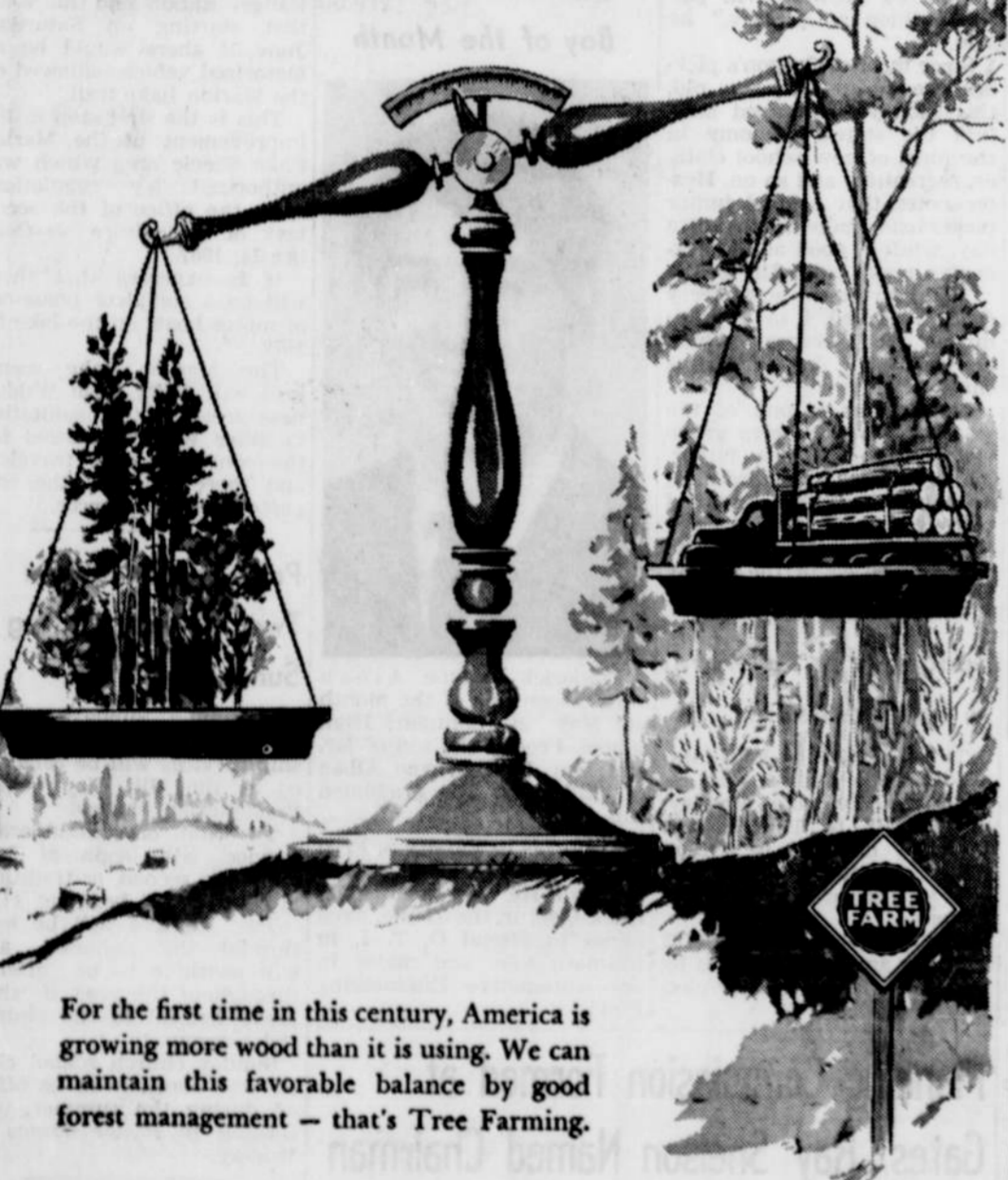

She was greeted by her grandson Capt. Jerry Larson and his family. Mrs. Brisbin and the Larson family then traveled together the remaining trip to view the different points of interest.

First to come, was the Board Walk in Atlantic City. They took the elevator up to the top of the Needle in Atlantic City, it was similar to the one in Seattle, except for being somewhat smaller. Mrs. Brisbin said the view was beautiful, as the entire city and the ocean could be viewed. The next point of interest was Valley Forge, in Pennsylvania. The Park tract covered approximately 2,800 acres, with the old, original buildings still remaining, being preserved and cared for by the World War Veterans. While in Pennsylvania, the Longwood Gardens were visited. The Gardens consisted of over 200 acres of land, which the Dupont Co. had donated and maintained for public free use.

Sights in Washington D.C. were visited, ones such as the Washington Monument, where the entire city could be viewed from the point at top of monument. Resurrection City, the Air and Space Buildings, and the Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials were also part of the attractions. An excursion through the U. S. Capitol Building, and Senate Buildings, and rotunda that held statues of men, famous in the forming of the nation's history.

Then returning to New York, where they spent the day touring the Empire State Building, which is 110 stories high, and to the Radio City Hall to see a show, and sight-seeing. They passed the White House, but did not go through the building as time wouldn't permit. President Kennedy's grave sight was visited, with pictures being taken there. She reported that all the large buildings in the large city seemed to look alike, and decided that it was about time to return home to Oregon to the uncomplicated pace of living as we are accustomed to out here.

She left New York at 6:45 E.S.T. and arrived in Portland at 12:45 P. M. Her husband and son, Ansel were there to meet her. She stated that the trip was wonderful and interesting, but was very glad to be home with family and friends.

## Shakespearean Festival to Have New Addition

A Fall groundbreaking date has been assured for the Oregon Shakespearean Festival's new, \$1.2 million indoor theatre addition, following announcement by Mrs. John Cotton, Festival Development Fund Executive chairman, that the organization's fund-raising efforts have reached the 86% mark.

A total of \$1,033,000 has been raised, according to Festival General Manager William Patton. "This lends new urgency to our whole program," he commented. "While this will allow us to start construction following our current season, we must still raise an additional \$170,000 to complete the Angus Bowen Theatre in time for our 1969 repertory."

"We are continuing to work with individuals, corporations and foundations throughout the country in an all-out effort to gain the remaining support so vital to this project," he commented.

The Festival Board received news of the accomplishment at their regular June meeting. It was announced at that time that a series of major gifts had brought the fund total to the \$1 million-plus stage.
