Adult Education To Start in Salem

The first Adult Evening School sponsored by the Adult Education Department of Salem Public schools will open June 17 at South Salem high school. In order to keep the term to five weeks, classes will meet two nights a week instead of the traditional one night per week, but the number of hours per class, and instruction covered will be the same as during the regular evening school year. The 18 classes open to the public are accounting, computer education, painting, reading improvement, real estate salesman's problems, shorthand speed building, typing beginning, typing of office and review, and vocabulary building and spelling for Monday and Wednesday evenings; with business English, English review, how to study, mathematics, modern problems, either semester, office machines, preparation for GED tests, and personal shorthand (briefhand) on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. The real estate class starts July 15 and runs for three weeks, and the how to study class meets on Tuesdays only. Under contract with agencies will be three Community Resources Incorporated classes on preparation for GED, as well as an expanded typing class, and preparation for GED class for Community Work and Training section of the Marion County Public Welfare Commission. The latter five classes will be conducted the entire summer.

High school credit is available for most classes, and students may earn one unit
