## Forest Service Cites More Than 12,000 Persons Per Day Visit Army Engineers Dams in May

Army Engineers' reservoirs in western Oregon were visited by 12,629 persons a day during May, according to Lieutenant Colonel John E. Thomas, Jr., Acting Portland District Engineer.

He said a total of 391,500 visitors were counted at the two Columbia River and ten Willamette Valley reservoirs during the 31-day period. The number brought the year's total through May to 1,234,700, compared to 1,033,731 for the same period last year.

Despite the overall increase in visitors this year, last May drew 487,751 people to the Army Engineers' reservoirs—96,251 more than this May.

Bonneville Dam on the Columbia River led the other projects with 103,100 visitors. They came to sightsee, fish, camp, picnic and boat. Thus far this year 406,500 have taken advantage of facilities at Bonneville Dam.

Running a close second behind Bonneville Dam, Fern Ridge Reservoir near Eugene attracted some 98,400 recreationists. The first five months of 1968 have seen 347,000 visitors to this project, which last year for the first time surpassed Bonneville Dam in total visitor attendance.

In third place during May was Detroit and Big Cliff Reservoirs east of Salem with five-month total of 106,000.

The Dalles Dam on the Columbia River was visited by 45,100 people in May, bringing the total so far this year to 117,700.

Other Willamette Valley reservoirs and the visitors attendances for May and the first five months of 1968 are: Fall Creek Reservoir south-east of Springfield, 21,800 visitors in May and 52,500 for the year through May. Lookout Point and Dexter Reservoirs near Lowell, 16,700 and 73,100.

Dorena Reservoir near Cottage Grove, 16,700 and 58,700. Cottage Grove Reservoir near Cottage Grove, 16,400 and 35,000.

Hills Creek Reservoir near Oakridge, 11,500 and 22,400.

Cougar Reservoir near Blue River, 7,000 visitors in May and 15,200 for the first five months this year.

Recreation facilities at the Corps of Engineers' reservoirs in the Willamette Valley and along the Oregon and Washington banks of the Columbia River at Bonneville

and The Dalles Dams are operated by the Portland U. S. Army Engineer District, U. S. Forest Service, Oregon and Washington state parks, counties and concessionaires.

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**Forest Service Cites Violators**

National Forest campground users are reminded that collection of fees at "Golden Eagle" sites is being enforced more closely this year.

Persons using facilities without having paid the \$1 daily fee or without being in possession of the annual \$7 "Golden Eagle Passport" are being issued notices of violation. For example, in the period May 26 to June 7, there were 17 notices of violation issued at Diamond Lake, Umpqua National Forest, one of the most heavily used recreation areas in the Pacific Northwest.

Biggest complaint from users in the first three years of operation of the pay program was lack of enforcement, according to Regional Forester Charles A. Connaughton, U. S. Forest Service. He emphasized that there is no charge to visit the National Forests, "but the nationwide Golden Eagle program for developed recreation sites must be administered in a manner that is fair to all." Twenty percent of the 1,208 developed campgrounds in the National Forests of Oregon and Washington are under the pay program.

Persons caught in violation are summoned to appear before a U. S. Commissioner, who will determine the penalty. The Land and Water Conservation Fund (Golden Eagle) Act provides for fine of up to \$100.
