Local Teacher Attends Science Institute in Ky.

One of the 97 science teachers selected from 20 states to attend the eight-week National Science Foundation Summer Science Institutes for teachers of science recently completed at Murray State University, Murray, Ky., is Bob Williams, teacher at Santiam High.

Participants enrolled in two courses selected from the fields of biology, chemistry, earth science, or physics, and excellent progress was made, according to the director, Dr. W. E. Blackburn, Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at the University.

In recognition of interest in teaching science, Mr. Williams was selected from a large number of applicants to receive this training which carried a stipend from the National Science Foundation. The purpose of the Institutes is to assist teachers in providing subject matter necessary for effective and stimulating instruction, including recent advances in science.

Outstanding nationally known scientists gave lectures and demonstrations. Field trips, laboratory studies, and experiments featuring the "do it" approach received emphasis in order to help the teacher interest his students and channel them into careers in science where the need is great and is becoming greater.

Tours included Reelfoot Lake, Land-Between-the-Lakes Recreation Area, the Calvert City industrial area, and plants of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Audio visual aid materials such as movies, slides and film strips were viewed. Books from the Science Library and other sources were placed at the disposal of the participants.

It's Your Law

Respect for Law Makes
Democracy Live

"You Can't Cancel My Hospital Policy!"

When Charlie applied for a hospitalization insurance policy he read the usual question—"Have you consulted with or been attended by a physician within the past five years?"

In his replay, Charlie mentioned a physical examination and some minor surgery he'd undergone seven years before. He did not mention, however some recent examinations by a doctor. These examinations indicated Charlie had heart trouble and other physical problems. The doctor recommended surgery, but Charlie refused to undergo it.

With the information given it, the application for the insurance was approved and a policy issued.

Later, Charlie made a claim against the policy for medical services. In its investigations of the claim, the company discovered the unmentioned medical treatments and problem.

The company offered to return to Charlie the amount of premiums he had paid together with interest and said that it was canceling the policy.

"You can't cancel my policy. I refuse to accept your offer," Charlie replied. The case went to court.

The insurance company argued that Charlie fraudulently made application for a policy and that the company would not have approved it, if it had known Charlie's heart condition and other physical problems.

"I didn't intentionally conceal these treatments—I forgot about them," was Charlie's reply.

The Court, however, ruled in favor of the insurance company. The omission was material. The company was entitled to have the policy voided.

The law recognizes that insurance contracts require the utmost of good faith. The company had to look to Charlie for the information on which to consider the issuance of a policy. The Court held Charlie's negative answers were wilfully false and fraudulently made, because his treatments were for a serious disorder that couldn't be overlooked.

(Oregon lawyers offer this column as a public service. No person should apply or interpret any law without the aid of an attorney who is completely advised of the facts involved. Even a slight variance in fact may change the application of the law.)

Census Bureau to Make Smoking Survey Here

Census Bureau interviewers will conduct a survey here concerning the smoking habits of the population during the week of August 19

Director John E. Tharaldson of the Census Regional Office in Seattle announced. Interviewers will ask the people's past smoking habits as well as present habits in order to discover whether there have been significant changes over the past year.

Interviews conducted locally are part of the third annual survey of smoking habits taken among a representative sample of the nation's population to provide statistical data for the U. S. Public Health Service.

The questions on smoking will be asked during the Bureau's monthly labor force inquiries. Questions about jobs are designed to provide data for use by the U. S. Department of Labor in determining current national employment and unemployment trends.

The identity of households in the survey throughout the U. S. is confidential, and the information obtained will be used only for statistical purposes.

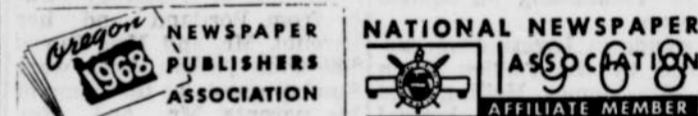
