Work Smarter . . Not Harder

FROZEN ORANGE JUICE CONCENTRATE should be placed immediately in home freezer storage and kept frozen until used. Marie Tribble, Oregon State University Extension nutritionist, says the safe storage period in the ice cube compartment of the refrigerator is one week; in a combination ice-cube-freezer compartment, three months; and in the freezer, one year.

Be sure to keep the juice frozen until you're ready to use it. If the freezer fails and the concentrate thaws, use it as soon as possible.

DEMONS OR HELPERS — that's what household cleaning products may be. These cleaners could be potential poisoners depending on how they are stored and used, especially if there is a small child in the house.

To protect your family, store household chemicals such as floor wax, metal polish and disinfectants separately from food and where children can't reach them. After using them, be sure to return them immediately to their safe storage cabinet.

Store in original containers. It's easy to mistake a product for something else if stored in another container.

Dispose of products in defaced or unlabeled bottles or cans. The directions on the label are important for correct usage and also list antidotes in case of accidental poisoning. Flush such products down the drain so there can be no mistake about what happens to them.

Every child shows symptoms of emotional disturbance at some periods of life. How can you tell whether this is something to worry about or just a passing phase?

There's no special test you can give that will tell you the answer, says Mrs. Roberta C. Frasier, Extension family life specialist, Oregon State University, but you can take your clues from the total life pattern of your youngster.

Emotionally stable children are usually happy Mrs. Frasier says. They find life on the whole enjoyable and usually appear contented, unless they are facing some critical situations.

The child who is emotionally healthy has "bounce". He may be upset if he doesn't get his way or if things go wrong, but worry, grief and anger don't persist over a long period of time.

Children who are emotionally healthy feel guilty when they've done something wrong and try to do something to make up for it. Healthy children respond appropriately to life. They may quarrel with brothers and sisters. They will respond to unjust accusation with anger. They won't be "good" all the time. They will probably have some fears.

Stable children have a relaxed quality. They tend to sprawl. When they walk or run they exhibit a loose-jointed way of moving. Healthy children are curious. They are full of ideas. They aren't willing to accept the thought there are only two ways of doing things—a right way and a wrong way. They think there are all kinds of ways and they want to try out as many as possible.

Healthy children act their age—most of the time. The child does not act like a "little man" or a "little woman", but acts in a way appropriate to his age level and the kind of discipline and guidance he has at home and school.

"Parents need to look at their home, school, and community to see if they are providing the kind of climate in which people can live in good mental health," says Mrs. Frasier.

It's Your Law

Respect for Law Makes Democracy Live Parking Lot Accident Mrs. Jones parked her car in the supermarket parking lot while she shopped. When she returned, she found that someone had backed into the side of her car, causing considerable damage. The other driver had left without leaving his name.

Fortunately, another shopper witnessed the accident and informed Mrs. Jones of the license number of the other car. What can Mrs. Jones do about it?

The police usually will not make an accident report, or issue a traffic citation occurring on private property.

The Motor Vehicle Code—which sets forth the rules of the road—applies only to the operation of motor vehicles public streets and highways. It does not apply to accidents on private property, such as a store's parking lot.

The police were glad, however, to obtain ownership of the offender's car from the license number and tell Mrs. Jones, so she could pursue her own remedies.

Even though the rules of the road do not apply off the street, the common law rules of negligence do. Thus, anyone who negligently causes injury or damage to another can be held civilly responsible for the damages. In this case, Mrs. Jones has a cause of action against the other person, and should be able to collect for the damage to her car.

Also, remember that the liability insurance carried by most vehicle owners DOES cover accidents both on and off the highway. Here the other car owner's insurance company would probably cover the damage to Mrs. Jones's car.
