Patricia Pennick Weds Vance Davidson in England Ceremonies

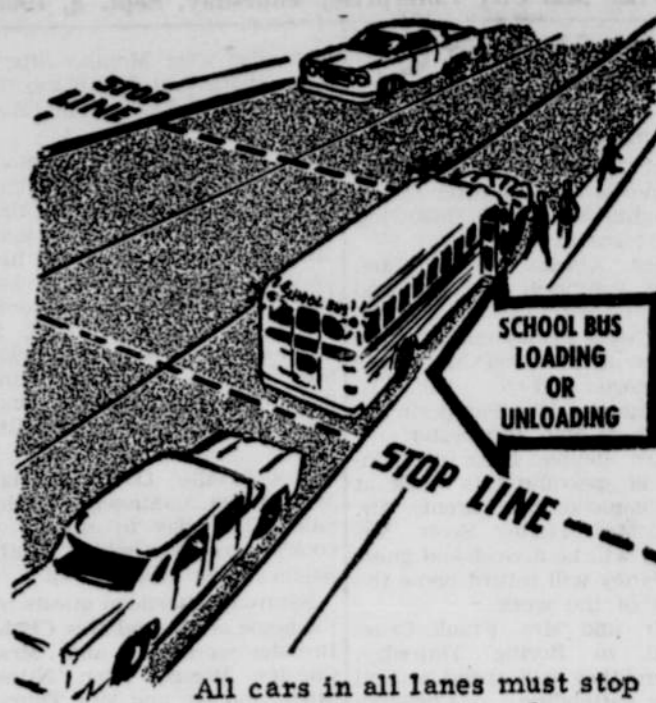
Miss Patricia Louise Pennick was married to Vance Iolo Davidson, August 10, at 12:45 a.m. ceremony in Walsall, England.

The couple will reside in England.

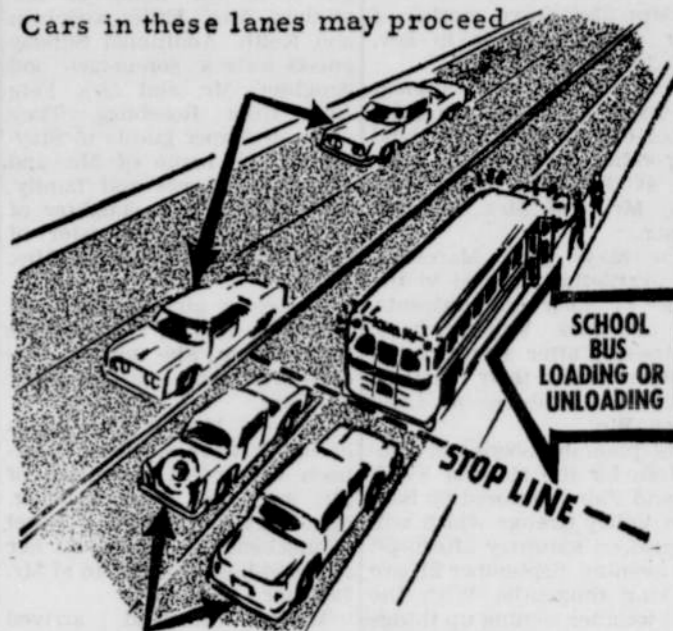
TWO OR THREE LANE HIGHWAY

School Buses To Roll Again....

Every school day in 1968-69 will bring some 2700 yellow school buses out on Oregon streets and highways to pick up 231,000 pupils and transport them to school, according to Dale Parnell, state superintendent of public instruction. These buses will travel in excess of 23,000,000 miles during the year.

"The biggest problem in this vast operation is providing for the safety of children as they cross lanes of traffic to board buses or leave them," says Parnell, who recently announced the start of a new school bus driver training program in Oregon. "Oregon has a school bus stop law, enacted in 1961," he reports, "but the law is still not followed by all."

The school bus stop law spec-

ifically states that on two or three lane highways, all vehicles in all lanes meeting or overtaking a school bus must stop and remain stopped as long as the red warning lights on the bus are flashing. On a highway with two or more lanes going in each direction, vehicles following a school bus must stop and remain stopped as long as the red warning lights are flashing. Vehicles in the on-coming, separate lanes are not required to stop.

Diagrams illustrating the law have been sent to all newspapers in the state by the Oregon Board of Education. "We urge the traveling public to study these diagrams, obey the law, and protect our precious school bus cargo," says State Superintendent Parnell.
