Log Production Drops 7 Percent From Previous Year

September 25, 1968—Oregon's 1967 log production totaling 8,281,761,000 board feet was a drop of almost 7 percent from last year and 12 percent below the year before; according to State Forester J. E. Schroeder, Oregon State Forestry Department.

This sharp decline of the past two years began in 1966 with tight money and the worst housing market in 20 years. The credit crunch of that year hovered over much of 1967. Then as the industry began working its way out of the doldrums along came a log shortage. Severe fire weather resulted in extensive logging closures during this time.

The Douglas fir region of western Oregon produced some 6,541,386,000 board feet of this year's volume, while about 1,740,375,000 board feet was grown in the ponderosa pine region of eastern Oregon. Western Oregon felt the impact by a harvest reduction of 554,178,000 board feet compared to last year, while eastern Oregon was about 62,073,000 board feet short.

Of the 8,281,761,000 board feet harvested by the forest industry in Oregon this past year, some 3,759,270,000 board feet or about 45.4 percent was logged from private lands. Forest Service managed national forests and 1,092,304,000 board feet or about 13.2 percent from Bureau of Land Management forests. Of the remaining three percent 139,771,000 board feet was harvested from state, county and municipal forest lands; and 109,616,000 board feet came from Indian lands.

Again, Douglas County was the top timber producer for the third straight year with a harvest of 1,469,731,000 board feet. This also marks the third straight year Lane County has been the second highest timber producer in the state. The Lane harvest amounted to 1,204,632,000 board feet.
Linn and Coos Counties re-

main third and fourth with respective harvests of 582,822,000 board feet and 481,457,000 board feet. Linn and Coos have battled with each other for third place since 1961. Jackson County log production amounted to 430,923,000 board feet for fifth place. Lincoln County was again sixth this year with 418,603,000 board feet of logs harvested.

In the forests of eastern Oregon, Klamath County remained on top where it has been for six years with a harvest of 280,384,000 board feet. Grant County traded places with Lake County for second place this year by harvesting 260,569,000 board feet compared with Lake 238,484,000 board feet for third place.
