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RAMBO'S RAMBLINGS

Well, does everyone have their Voter's pamphlet handy—mine hasn't arrived yet but over here in Marion county we always seem to be behind in getting things—including property tax statements. Not that we are anxious to look at them—but this year they were supposed to arrive in the middle of October instead of about three days before time to pay.

But back to elections—if I am ever going to spout off on that now is the time—but don't think Nixon is the ONE. Am real cool towards all presidential candidates this year but will cast my vote for Humphrey—not being one of those hat feel he will follow the Johnson pattern. And how does anyone really know what they will do once the office is taken. But I will say that the only one that really frightens me—is Wallace. Also I will certainly take Muskie over Agnew—and he way the bullets fly now—lays it pays to take a long hard look at the vice-presidential imbroglio.

Thinking about the measures on the ballot—and the controversial measure No. 6 in regard to acquiring beach property—some say it's bad and some say it's good. But thinking about our wonderful Oregon Coastline our readers might be interested in the following item by Art Seidenbaum in the Los Angeles Times, issue of October 9.

Its title is Somewhere out there is a Pacific Ocean— Until I saw the Oregon shore this summer, I thought the following rules of chaos applied to our whole West Coast:

If a beach is beautiful, then there is no public access to it. If a beach has access, then it will probably be converted into a power station, freeway route, marina or parking lot. When greed proposes, man disposes.

The current issue of Cry California, loudest conservation journal in this state, worries about how these inhuman rules come to pass. Writer Curt Gentry explains the way highwaymen keep wanting to swap sand for the freeway system. He ticks off the violence—present and planned—along our 1,000 miles of coast and then yells for halt.

"There is no area on the California coastline—whether on its beaches, along its bluffs or through its seaside communities—which can support, without extensive destruction, the massive freeways demanded by current highway standards. The two are not compatible." What he urges is an immediate moratorium on further freeways along the shore, a moratorium to remain in effect until the governor's office completes its over-all plan for California's embattled coast.

After Oregon, I'm more convinced. Living just above us is a state that deliberately put its public face to the Pacific and wound up with a coast as accessible as it is magnificent.

You can hardly drive five minutes along Oregon 101 without swerving into a state park. Each of them is carefully planned, with trees and shrubs separating the people from the parking places. Each of them has picnic spaces and real facilities for rest, not just a comode by the side of the road. Each of them is clean, green and serene—about as unlike the standard California roadside rest as Venice East and is unlike Venice West.

Now I grant this began in

Oregon several governments ago, a rare case of executive foresight before the blight. I grant that Oregon doesn't have the same man-machine boom that dropped on California. And I grant that, between parks, Oregon has its own set of eyesores—from smoking lumber plants to jangling cheap motels.

Still, that state recognizes shoreline as much more than a running profile for a freeway. Oregon obviously spends man-made money to preserve, enhance its natural resource. That's the compatible relationship. In California, we seem to spend our natural resources to enhance the prospect of man-made money.

Since this seems to be a critical (constructive, I hope) column this time—I am one of those that would like to see a sewage system put in for the ENTIRE city. We keep crying that there aren't enough houses to fill the needs of those wishing to settle here. Which is true. But there is also a lot of good land going to waste on smelly drainage systems from septic tanks—just once before I die I would like to be free from that perpetual pain in the neck. A lot of you will say "my septic tank never causes me a bit of trouble." But it depends on the soil, drainage conditions and how long you live—you better believe that SOMEONE is going to have trouble with it sometime.

Of course it would increase our taxes but in talking to some people recently from the little town of Jefferson a sewage system was placed in that city without too much uproar—or increase in taxes. I might add that they also have a new municipal swimming pool.

I'll bet you to it—in case you want to say, "if you like it there why don't you move." I happen to like it HERE—but I also like PROGRESS.
