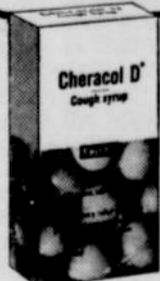

Thanksgiving All Along Santiam Highway

DETROIT—Six hundred Thanksgiving bound turkeys were scattered along the North Santiam Highway four miles east of Marion Forks Wednesday night following a truck wreck.

Larry Heer, 58, of Salem, driver of the truck was taken to a Silverton Hospital by Detroit Mobile First Aid Unit following the 10:00 P.M. accident.

The turkeys were being transported by Pilgrim Turkey Packers from Redmond to Salem when a front tire blew out causing the truck to leave the highway and strike a tree. The impact smashed the cab, splintered the wooden bed of the truck, and spilled the Thanksgiving birds along the highway. Reports indicated 100 birds were killed and maimed. According to state police almost all of the birds were rounded up during the night.

Heer was taken to Silverton hospital where he was released Thursday morning after treatment of a hip injury, cuts and bruises.
