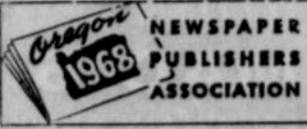

## November Both Warm and Wet In Detroit Area

DETROIT — According to weatherman, Frank Hancock, who has been keeping track of the weather pluse during the absence of Joe Muise, the Detroit area has received 16.70 inches of precipitation for the month of November. Average per day was listed as .556.

Greatest amount of rainfall in a 24 hour period was recorded as 3.24 inches on the 9th day of November.

Warmest day of the month also fell on the 9th when the temperature was 59 degrees. Lowest temperature reading was recorded on the first day of Nov. when the temperature dipped to a cool 25 degrees.

There were 7 days of sunshine and 9 days when the temperature reading was recorded as 32 degrees or below that degree.

The upper North Santiam Canyon received its first snow of the season Saturday when 3 1/2 inches of snow was measured at Detroit. It has melted except on lawns and in shady areas.

## Your Social Security

By C. I. Flaten, Dist. Mgr. Medicare's Medical Insurance Carry-Over Deductible

Did you know that you may be able to use some of this year's doctor bills to meet next year's \$50 deductible under Medicare's medical insurance? Well, read on.

According to Clair Flaten, social security district manager, if your expenses for covered services are \$50.00 or less for 1968, then any expenses for covered services you have in October, November or December of this year can count toward your 1969 \$50 deductible.

For example, in the year 1969 your expenses for covered services are \$45.00. Of this, \$30.00 as part of next year's \$50.00 deductible. This means that when your covered medical expenses next year go over \$20.00, you will have met the \$50 deductible for 1969. So be sure to send these carry-over bills in with your first claim next year.

If your expenses for covered services do not go over \$50.00 until the last three months of 1968, says Mr. Flaten, then any expenses in the last 3 months of 1968 which counted toward the \$50 deductible for this year can be counted again toward the \$50.00 deductible for 1969.

For example, your expenses were \$20.00 for January through September and \$70.00 for October through December 1968 (making a total of \$90.00). You can count \$30.00 of the October-December expenses toward the \$50.00 deductible for 1968—and you can count the \$30.00 again toward the \$50.00 deductible for 1969.

Since you have met the \$50.00 deductible for 1968, medical insurance pays 80 percent (or \$32.00) of your \$40.00 of expenses above the deductible.

For further information about Medicare or any other Social Security matter, contact the social security district office at 702 Church Street NE in Salem. Telephone number 585-1793. Office hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. For the convenience of those who cannot come in during regular hours, the office is open until 7:30 p.m. Monday evening.
