HOLD-THE-LINE BUDGET ONLY HALF THE ANSWER

The 1969-71 record state budget presented by Gov. Tom McCall last week proposes a moderate, economy-minded spending program based upon current levels of revenue and relying heavily upon continuing steady economic growth. It proposes no tax increase or new taxes. It contains no major new programs, no major expansion of existing ones. Linked with a state government reorganization and streamlining program, it seeks to hold the line on costs of state government administration.

But in many ways the new budget is most interesting for what it presupposes or does not say. It does project an increase of 23.4 per cent in general fund expenditures over this biennium, beginning with a \$33.8 million balance to be carried over. It assumes that continuing expansion of the state's economy will produce the necessary additional revenue at current tax levels.

The \$718.8 million general fund budget proposed by Gov. McCall is up \$148.1 million from that of 1967-69. Not widely recognized, however, is the fact that the percentage increase in revenue to come from personal income taxes, main source of general fund moneys, will be smaller than that of 1967-69.

The main question left unanswered in the budget message is that of property tax relief. The governor expects to announce his plans for a relief program this week, including senior citizens' property tax relief.

While the budget contains \$38 million for local property tax relief, that amount is not considered sufficient to provide relief of the magnitude

demanding by the sizeable vote for the 1 1/2 per cent limitation measure. Significant relief will require a new revenue source—a state sales tax or increased income tax—to take some of the burden off local property taxes.

Legislators generally vote property tax relief as their number one item of business when they convene here next month. But if they do not produce a program, or if voters defeat the program the legislature is likely to refer, then property tax relief adjustments in the budget must be considered.

For example, the budget contains no general fund appropriations for senior citizens' relief or for inventory tax relief. The homestead exemption offset would require \$5.3 million to continue; inventory tax relief would need \$26.7 million from the general fund to fulfill legislative intentions to phase out half the tax from 1966 to 1970.

Other adjustment needs may well arise from the governor's proposed government reorganization. The budget is tailored to restructured state government and many of its items are contingent on its adoption.

Reorganization proposals, under "Project 70's," are the result of months of intensive study by a task force of four professors of political science, public administration and business administration. Their intention is "to give Oregon citizens and their elected leaders some control over coming events, so that they and their institutions of government will not be overwhelmed by the problems of the 1970's."

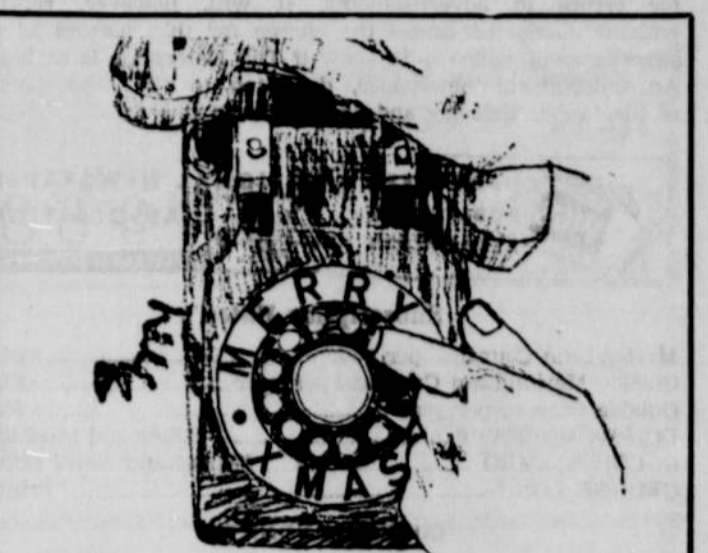
Plans would group many state agencies with related functions in nine new or expanded main departments under the governor. They would be: social services, natural resources, consumer and employee protection, executive, revenue and taxation, transportation, public employment relations board, general services and environmental quality. Twenty other departments would remain separate.

The legislature would have to approve such changes, and the Senate and House for many years have failed to agree on Constitutional revision plans, which have included similar reorganization ideas.

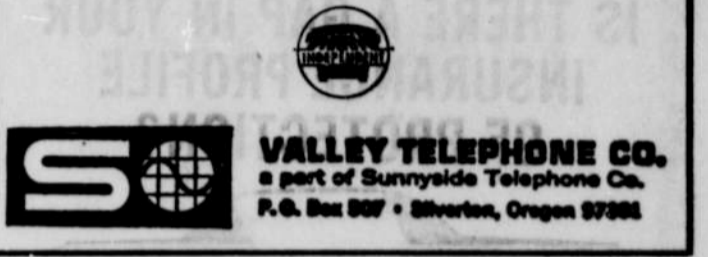
Moreover, the Joint Ways and Means Committee must immediately begin its long and hard task of revising the budget. Lacking the time to first study and approve 'Project 70's' recommendations, the legislature likely will have to consider revenue and spending in line with present organization. There remains, of course, Gov. McCall's proposal for property tax relief — the other half of the answer which may modify current views of his proposed budget.

And then there will be two intriguing questions as property tax relief assumes the dominant role in legislative considerations. What will the legislature do with the governor's proposals. And, what will voters do to support the legislature in its mission to provide tax reform?

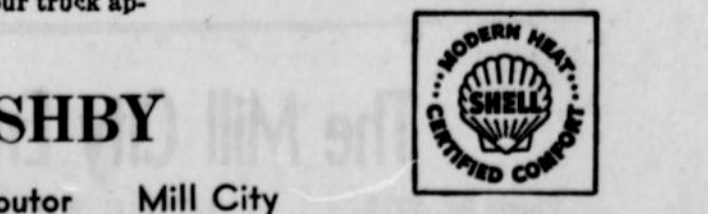


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
