Crews Kept Busy Removing Snow in Mehama Area

MEHAMA — The Marion County road crew is working around the clock attempting to keep every road in the Mehama area passable. Snow has piled up fast on county roads over 800 feet in elevation, with only 50 to 100 feet in elevation making the difference in several inches of snow.

County graders, sometimes working in twos, one an auxiliary to assist the other, have been trying to keep the snow off the road before it gets so deep that the graders will not be able to move it.

Kubin Hill road, a scant 3 miles, required 6 hours of steady grading to make it passable Friday morning. It had been opened the night before but another foot of snow that night, added to what was already there to make a total of 31 inches and somewhat heavy to push.

It was necessary to open the road past the last residence as Nick Wagners cows were stranded in 3 feet of snow in a pasture along the road and the road had to be graded open so the animals could be fed. This area is only 2 miles above Mehama but a higher elevation.

Animals are seen standing with long icicles on their sides. Snow on their backs melts and as it runs off it freezes resulting in icicles sometimes over a foot long hanging on the sides.

Some people are feeding birds and have coveys of wild quail as well as juncos and snow birds as regular guests. Pearl Cooper was upset when some starlings moved in and chased away the other birds.
