### Snow Piled Up In Upper Canyon Area; More Predicted

DETROIT—Snow continues to pile up in the Upper North Santiam Canyon and residents continue to dig out from the heavy accumulation. School resumed Tuesday after being closed Monday along with many other schools in the state following the week-end heavy deluge of snow.

Mills in the area had been working around the clock to keep ponds, mill facilities and equipment free of snow and ice, but Sunday Morning Green Veneer Inc., and Stuckart Lumber Co. Idanha, closed down.

Ray Monroe, Supt. at Green Veneer said one of the contributing factors in the closing of the mill was because a number of their employees residing in various mid-valley towns were unable to make it to work due to hazardous driving conditions both in the valley and in the North Santiam Canyon. He said "we feel that the safety and welfare of employees is more important than the maintaining of the mill operation. He added "the mill will remain closed until there is a break in weather conditions". This also holds true for Stuckart Lumber Co.

John Madarus, manager of U. S. Plywood Champion Papers Inc. Idanha, said the Plywood Mill would continue to operate unless weather conditions forces a closure.

In the Detroit area weatherman, Frank Hancock reported the area received 5 inches of new snow in a 24 hour period ending at 9:00 A. M. Tuesday morning. This was somewhat less than the 12 to 15 inches in a 24 hour period the area received over the week-end. Monday ground level snow was recorded as 56 inches. Tuesday the snow had settled to 52½ inches at the 9:00 A. M. reading.

The heavy snow continues to result in damage to buildings, shrubs and trees not of the native type. At the Lyle Rogers trailer home a metal awning collapsed from the snow, and at the Detroit Christian Community Church the porch at the entrance of the church has receded eight inches from its attachment to the building. Services at the church have been curtailed for the past two Sundays. A student minister, B. J. Brown from the Northwest Christian College at Eugene has been conducting services at the church. It has been noted at the Champion home, where a large number of birds are being fed, a spring robin has been arriving daily for a hand-out along with a variety of other birds including quail. We are wondering now if he had a fall-out with his tribe, or if he thought he was tough enough to winter here.

In the Marion Forks area more than 160 inches of snow has fallen during the month of January.

Ground level snow to date (Tuesday) is estimated at better than six feet there.

### Work Smarter . . Not Harder

NEW PAINT ON WALLS WILL HELP BRIGHTEN winter days. Here's a word of caution about color from Mrs. Dorothy Brown, Oregon State University Extension home furnishings specialist. Colors aren't always what they seem—especially when you're looking at a tiny color chip. Pick the color you want from the small sample, then buy one that's 20 percent lighter.

Mrs. Brown explains that color becomes both brighter and darker when spread over a large area. You can save money and frustration by purchasing a trial quart of the selected color. If it turns out to be a good choice, then the rest of the paint can be bought without qualms. If it's not what you want only the cost of the quart is lost instead of the price of a gallon or more plus the labor involved in putting it on.

CLEANING BEHIND THE REFRIGERATOR is as important for fire prevention as for sanitation. Lint and dust accumulate here and act as fuel which can be ignited by a spark from the motor.

Thoroughly clean the floor and back of the refrigerator with the vacuum cleaner. Don't miss running the brush or crevice tool around the motor because this is where a fire would begin.

If you're in the market for a new refrigerator later on, you might want to consider those that have rollers so they can be easily moved.

NON-SKID THROW RUGS MAY LOSE THEIR GRIP simply because of dirt. The backing is designed to create a suction action which holds the rug to the floor. Suction is broken when dirt or floor wax clogs the ridges of the backing.

Try turning the rug over, then scrubbing the underside with a stiff brush and soap suds. Rinse and dry before flipping over.

If the backing becomes worn off, the rug may skid. In this case you can buy a special preparation to spray on. It's made especially to help rugs stay put. Hardware or department stores have this for sale.
