**Detroit City Council
To Amend Ordinance
On Highway Parking**

DETROIT—At the regular meeting of the Detroit City Council an amendment to ordinance 37 was passed by the council to prohibit parking of vehicles on the shoulders of highway 22 from 50 feet west of the westerly Breitenbush Road intersection to Santiam Ave.; or on any other intersection within the city limits which would create hazardous conditions to the flow of traffic.

Other council business included a discussion on a planning committee to improve communication between the city council and the people.

Sewer problems were also discussed. It was decided the council would contact the Corp of Engineers or someone else on sewer authority to help find a solution to the problem. At the councils next meeting, March 11th, they plan to discuss and adopt a proposed Building Code Ordinance for small cities which will allow Marion County to inspect buildings for their fee.

**Snow Settles to 29
Inches at Detroit**

For Detroit School**

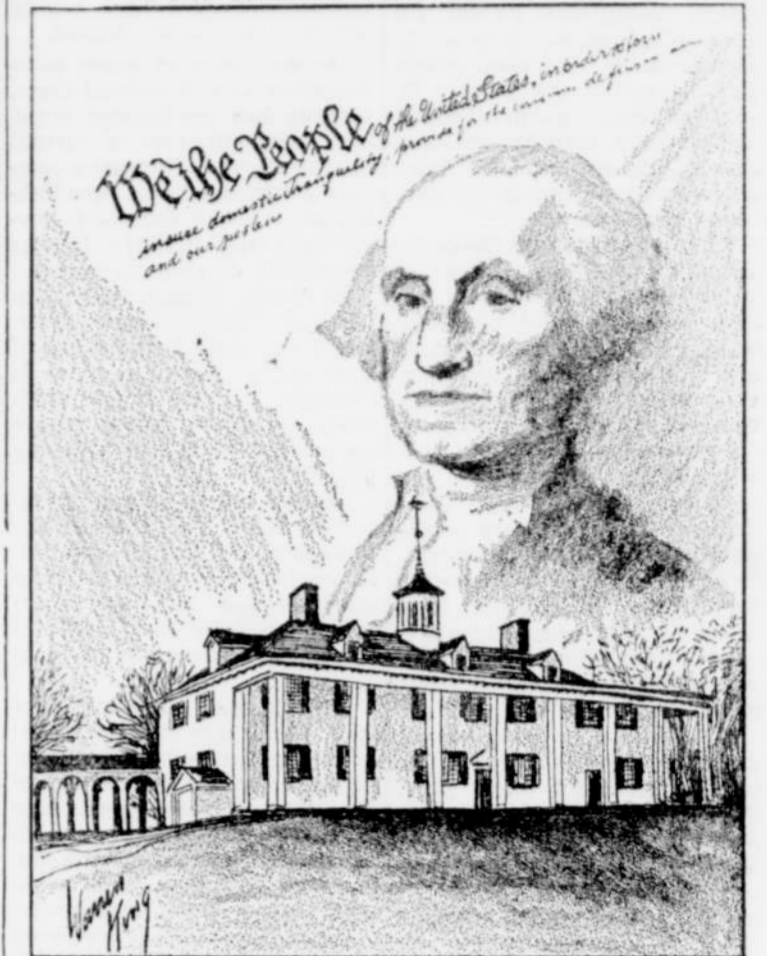
