Detroit Basketball Team Takes Third Place in State Tournament

DETROIT—Detroit captured third place Saturday by downing Malin 72-68 in a contest at Pendleton which went into three overtimes.

The Detroit Cougars scored 10 points in the third overtime to down the Malin Mustangs 72-68 and to capture third place in the tourney. The Cougars rallied on free throws by Lyle Rogers and Dorsey Smith and a tip-in by Gerald Hiebert to end their season with 23-6 record.

Detroit was led by Rogers with 26 points, with three of his mates also hitting in double figures. Smith and Hiebert had 15 apiece and sophomore Jay Harvey 10. This offset a 34 point outburst from the Mustang's Carl Conroy. Malin jumped to an early lead and was head after the first stanza 16-10. Detroit rallied in the second period and at the intermission trailed by one, 29-28. Detroit finally grabbed the lead early in the third quarter scoring 14 points to Malin's 11. They led at the start of the fourth quarter, 42-40.

Malin rallied in the fourth period and tied the game at 57 as the buzzer sounded. Both teams played cautious in the first overtime and the score ended knotted at 60 all. Neither team could penetrate the other's defense for a scoring burst and at the end of the second extra period, the score was tied at 62-62. This set the stage for the Cougar's surge which netted them 10 points, while Malin only connected for six.

Rogers tallied 60 points in the three game tourney to average 20 points per game. Hiebert and Smith tallied 45 and Mustang's Conroy scored 73 points in the tourney.

B-Tourney All-star team picked at the Oregon Class B High School basketball tournament are Lyle Rogers, Detroit; Tim Wetherell, of Arlington; Carl Conroy of Marlin, Dick Hall of Elkton, and Mike Koller of Elgin. Detroit was also the recipient of a sportsmanship award.

In the first game of the State B basketball tourney on Thursday, Detroit downed previously unbeaten Columbia Christian 54-51 in overtime. Columbia Christian entered the tourney as the only unbeaten team with 25 victories, while Detroit was 21-5.

Detroit was behind 12-9 after the first period and 25-22 at half-time. A 14-8 third period margin for the Cougars was the big difference, pulling them ahead 36-33. But the Portlanders won the final quarter 13-10, forcing the extra three minutes. Detroit took the overtime period 8-5 after the 46-46 tie. Lyle Rogers Detroit's high scoring junior forward, led all scorers with 18 points. Gerald Hiebert had 13 and Dorsey Smith 10.

Wayne Bucklelew, the tallest athlete on the court at 6' 4" had 15 points for the Isers. Elton and Elgin, captured semi-final victories Friday to gain the finals of the Oregon

State Basketball tournament. Elkton defeated Malin 56-48 and Elgin nipped Detroit 69-67 in championship bracket games.

Detroit led Elgin 33-31 at halftime in the afternoon's second game, a championship bracket tilt. Detroit was ahead 18-15 after the first period, lost the second 16-15 and lost the third 25-15 for a 56-48 deficit entering the final period.

The Cougars rallied in the final stanza to knot the score at 67-67, but Elgin's Ron Townsend sank two free throws with one second left to clinch the victory.

Detroit had five players score and four hit double figures. Senior Dorsey Smith and Gerald Hiebert had 18 and 17 respectively. Junior ace Lyle Rogers tallied 16 and Sophomore Jay Harvey 13.

Detroit was decked out in street banners and posters for the homecoming Sunday. A reception was held at the Elementary school about 4 p. m. While the community is still staggering under the blow of losing their high school building some person or persons even tried to do away with the homecoming banners. They were apparently scared off after taking a large banner from Detroit Patio around 2:30 a. m. Sunday morning. The incident along with a description of the car was reported to the State Police.

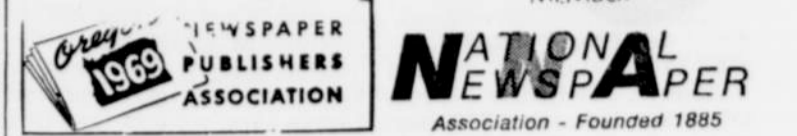

Spencer Hillesland is band director at Santiam High school with that group, as well as the chorus, always presenting superior performances.

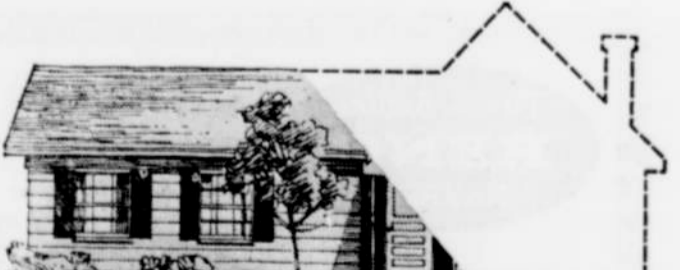
