#### Detroit Lake To Have Debris Removed

DETROIT-A recent contract let by the U.S. Forest Service for the removal of some 48 acres of stumps along Sunday after church. The the lake frontage of Detroit Lake State Park, has been postponed until this fall, Forester Al Sloan said. Due to the heavy snow pack in the mountains a possible sudden runoff has not been ruled out, he added. Should this occur the contractor would not be able to complete the project in the allowable time limit.

The contract was awarded to Buckanan Excavating Co. of Junction City. Sloan said the Forest Service is planning to remove debris from the Reservoir as soon as the water rises enough to get the job done. He said burning of debris is now in progress in some areas on the dry beds of the lake.
