Gary Richards turned in his best time this year capturing first place and with a 4:43.5 mile, breaking the old school record of 4:50. Gary also ran a 2:10 880 to take another first in the meet.

In the 220, Doug Cline broke the old school record of 24.1 with a time of 24.0 to take first place. Doug also took first in the 100 with 10.5, tying the school record.

Ordinance No. 37 defining junk, prohibiting the keeping thereof in certain places in the city and prescribing penalties for violation and establishing an emergency. Both Ordinances passed and are now in full force and effect.

To clear up any misunderstanding, it should be pointed out that while the State Parks are opening on April 12 in preparation for the fishing season, this does not mean that the season begins on that date. It is recommended that if there is any question about the opening of the fishing season in any area, local game officials be consulted.

Salem Tech To Have Firemen Classes April 12-13

An overwhelming response has been received to the Oregon Fireman Training special school to be held at Salem Technical Community College April 12 and 13. Both volunteer and paid firemen will attend.

Enrollment has been limited to 150 persons in these sessions concerned with rescue techniques involving fire, cave-in, building collapse and vehicle accidents. Because the sessions have been heavily over subscribed, there is a possibility that the course will be repeated later this spring.

There will be two full days of classes scheduled, from 8:00 a.m. daily and continuing until 5:00 p. m., Saturday, and 4:00 p. m., Sunday.

Art Taylor, assistant chief, Tualatin R.F.P.D. (rural fire protection district), will instruct the Fire Rescue class. This is designed to provide participants with skill training that has proven successful in fire rescue.

Building Collapse Rescue will be taught by Lt. Maurice Obenhouse of the Portland Fire Department. This class provides each participant with an opportunity to learn how he can be more effective. Persons will actually be rescued from two wrecked cars.

Capt. Wilson Butts of the Portland Fire Dept., will teach the Cave-In Rescue sessions. Demonstrations will emphasize effective rescue techniques. Firemen will learn of special equipment to be built for cave-in rescue. Vehicle Rescue will be taught by Capt. Raymond "Tex" Davis of the Portland Fire Department.

Advance registration indicates that students will be coming from Salem, Marion County Fire District Number 1, Monmouth, Beaverton, Carlton, McMinnville, Woodburn, Sheridan, Willamina, Forest Grove, Keizer Rural, Canby, Corvallis, and many other Oregon cities.
