## Winter Weather Summary In Upper Canyon

DETROIT—January proved to be cooler than the 25 year average for that month by about 1½ degrees, under the average mean of 34 degrees.

The high for the month was 42 degrees on the 6th, and low was 6 degrees on the 24th.

Total precipitation of 18.20 inches was far from the existing record for the 27.06 inches established in 1953. The driest January, according to existing records was in 1963 when only 2.97 inches was recorded; probably due to the fact there was only 21 inches of snowfall that month.

Record snow fall for the month was 120.5 inches, thought to be a new record for January, but a check up disclosed 122.5 inches of accumulated snow for the month in 1950.

However, a checking of the winter totals of snow fall in October through March inclusive shows the record snow accumulation was measured a total of 160.5 inches for the winter of 1968-69. The former record was 159 inches in winter 1949-50.

January 1969 also established the greatest snow fall in a 24 hour period of 15 inches on the 27th. The former record was 14 inches on the 19th in 1960. The record 24 hour snow fall in 25 years, for any month was 16 inches on March 6, 1951. The greatest precipitation in a 24 hour period is 5.37 inches on January 28, 1965.

February also was cooler, 4 degrees under the average mean of 38 degrees. The warmest day was the 18th, 55 degrees, and the coolest was the 6th, 23 degrees. Record high 76 degrees in 1968, and low 10 degrees below zero in 1950.

Precipitation was 5.07 inches, about 4 inches less than the 25 year normal for February of 9.8 inches, and considerable under the record of 21.63 inches for February, 1961.
