Lebanon May Get P P & L Steam Plant

A possibility that a Linn County tract east of Lebanon might eventually be the site of a steam-electric generating plant in the series planned for the Pacific Northwest was indicated Monday by Pacific Power & Light Company in a report disclosing a property acquisition program.

The power company emphasized the long-term aspects of the power supply planning work, the future and the fact that looking 10 to 15 years into whether the land is ever used for a plant location depends on a number of factors yet to be determined.

Drilling crews assigned to establishing geological data in the area, about three or four miles east of Lebanon, are due to begin work within a few weeks, the company reported.

"The same kind of program is underway elsewhere in the company's system, including studies of additional hydroelectric capacity on rivers of the western slope of the Cascades and coal reserves in Washington, Montana and Wyoming," the company stated.

Pacific Power is an active member of the Northwest Joint Power Planning Council, which recently announced a series of seven of the steam-electric plants the region has scheduled to be in service during the 1970's. The first in the series is a 1,400,000-kilowatt coal-fired plant now under construction near Centralia, Wash., by PP&L and The Washington Water Power Company and other utilities.

The schedule calls for Pacific Power to be the principal sponsor of a 1,000,000-kilowatt plant, the third in the series, for service in 1975-76.

DETROIT — Detroit Lake State Park opened officially last Saturday, and crews have been working nearly around the clock to get everything in order for the opening of fishing season this Saturday. A spokesman at the Park said Monday all camping sites are now open with the exception of about six which they hoped to have in readiness by this week-end. All other facilities such as water, lights and shower accommodations are operating.

The parking area and boat ramp at Mongold has been cleared of snow, and it was reported launchings of boats can be made at the ramp.

At Detroit Lake Resort and Slaydens (formerly Sniders-Resort), boats will be available and both resorts have made arrangements for launching them. Due to the docks being high and dry yet because of the low water level large boats will not be able to be launched at this time at either of the resorts unless some miracle occurs between now and Saturday.

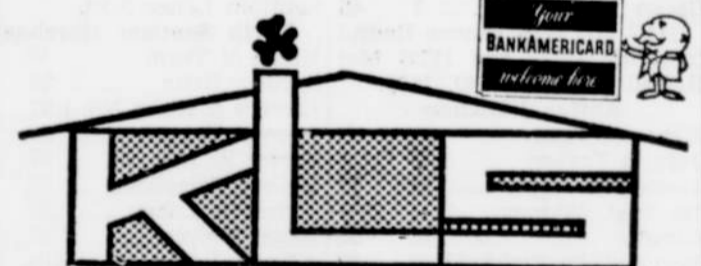
