DETROIT—Marion County Sheriff's department hosted some 300 emergency service representatives from Oregon and Washington from the Pacific Northwest Search and Rescue Conference here over the weekend.

The program included demonstrations and simulated search and rescue exercises Saturday and Sunday. Activities were held on the south shore of Detroit Lake. At least 12 teams participated in the exercise Sunday, including a team from Hamilton AFB, Calif.

Demonstrations Saturday included radio communications, water search and rescue by helicopter. The Air Force also presented a demonstration. The program ended Sunday with a night road search operation conducted by Marion County Jeep patrol.

Voters approved their school budget levy 59-30. It is \$157,674 over the 6 per cent limit. Total levy is \$193,339.


