Large spikes had been driven in the ventilator after last year's break-in to discourage

The robbery was not discovered until Friday morning when owner, Jim Girod opened the store and found the gaping hole with fragments of she rock all over the floor.

The odd part of the break-in was the fact that the only thing actually known to be taken were rolls of pennies amounting to about \$10.00. Mr. Girod said about \$25.00 in other loose change was not touched and if other merchandise was taken it was an extremely small amount

The store has been plagued by shoplifters in recent years and installed a "TV camera" in the ceilings which has cut down on that problem.

Mr. Girod and Florent Fritchl, manager, said that a burglar alarm system had been considered for some time and that the latest robbery would probably force the issue.
