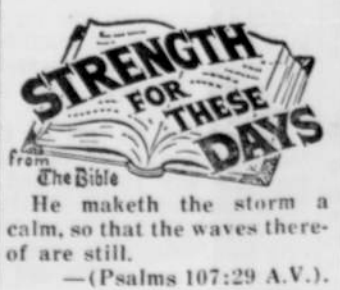

**Area People Attend Ten-Pin Tourney**

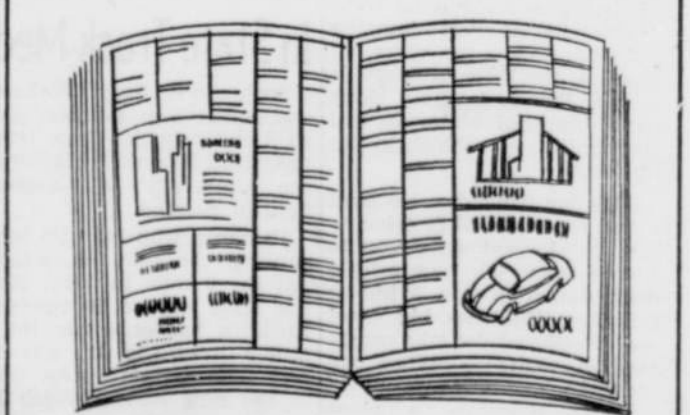
A number of local bowling fans attended the state bowling tournament at Pendleton last week. Many of them participated in the tourney and others were there to view the action.

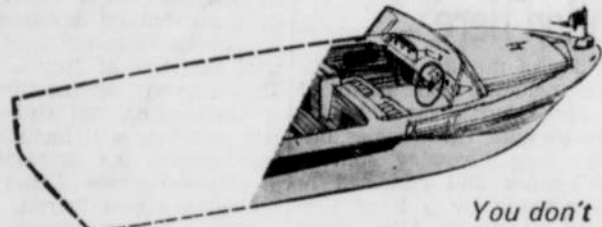
