

Fred Berg is "Jack of all Trades" For Pacific Power & Light Company

To the citizen's of Mill City, Fred Berg is Mister PP&L.

The 54 year-old veteran has been on the job with PP&L for nearly 23 years and does a great variety of chores, from restoring service after power outages and installing new services, to operating PP&L's water filtration plant.

Fred is a journeyman serviceman—but to his friends and PP&L's customers of Mill City, he is known as a "Jack-of-all-tradesman."

Many people take electricity and water for granted, and have little idea of the complicated steps involved in producing, transmitting and distributing electric energy and domestic water, according to Berg.

Berg's part-time balliwick is the complex water control center. He's responsible for the water production equipment, including filtration and purification, and adjusts the flow of water to match the capacity required by the people of Mill City.

In addition to monitoring the automatic water filtration equipment Berg, in the wake of heavy winter storms, might be working around-the-clock repairing fallen service lines to restore power. Other days find him testing voltage, checking customers' complaints or driving for miles to install new electric services.

He also maintains the city's street lights, dozens of rural light guards and all of PP&L's electrical and water facilities in Mill City.

The serviceman's work is exacting and technical, and adventuresome in terms of customer relations. It calls for tact, friendliness, and, on occasion, determination and perseverance.

All of this is in itself a full-time job, but Fred has a knack for squeezing in an additional hour or two for community activities and civic affairs, especially when it comes to helping the Mill City Lions Club. Berg began work for PP&L

as a groundman in Springfield in 1946 after serving eight years with the U. S. Navy. In 1947 he was promoted to equipment operator and in 1949 began his serviceman apprenticeship. In 1960 he was promoted and transferred to Yakima, Wash., as a lineman representative. He remained in that position until 1963 when he was promoted and transferred to Mill City as journeyman serviceman.

Timber Sales To Go On Block At Ranger Station

DETROIT—Three Willamette National Forest timber sales are scheduled to go on the auction block the latter part of this month at Detroit Ranger Station. Largest of the three is the Horn Creek No. 3 sale with an estimated 4,900,000 board feet of timber. The sale is scheduled for 10:00 A. M. June 20th.

The stand is located about 14 miles S.E. of the Detroit Ranger Station. It involves 3,500 MBF of Douglas-fir logs and peeler blocks, an unestimated amount of Douglas fir special cull logs and 1,400 MBF of western hemlock and other coniferous species. Advertised rate per thousand is Douglas fir \$89.50, Douglas fir special cull logs \$4.60, Western hemlock and other species \$48.00. Douglas fir special cull logs and blocks will be sold at fixed rates.

In addition there is within the sale area an estimated 157 acres of all species of substandard logs which the bidder may elect to purchase at \$2.50 per acre. Bids may be submitted for either the standard timber alone or for the standard timber if included in the bid, (optional) will be sold at the advertised rate.

In addition there is within the sale area an estimated 293 acres of all species of substandard logs which the bidder may elect to purchase at a \$1.00 per acre (optional) the advertised rate if included in the sale.

Respect for Law Makes Democracy Live
"WHERE ARE YOUR LICENSE PLATES?"
Jerry built a midget racer. He had a special little track on his property and he liked to zip around the loop whenever he had a chance.

After a while, Jerry got tired of going around in circles. Late one night he took the little racer out to the highway and zipped away. He got the little car up to 75 m.p.h. when he heard the siren. It was the Highway Patrol—right behind him.

Jerry pulled off the road and stopped.
"Well, I guess you've got me for speeding," Jerry admitted as the patrolman approached.

"I've got you for more than that," the patrolman answered. "Where are your license plates? Let me see this car's registration."

"This car is a racer designed for my own track. I never registered it," Jerry replied.

"Well, you should have thought of that before you took it onto the highway. Any powered vehicle that is driven on the highway must be registered, have license plates and be driven by a properly licensed driver," the patrolman said.

So Jerry got several citations for his little jaunt.
Certain powered vehicles are not required to have license tags because they are never used on the highways. These include various types of earth-moving equipment, racing cars and others.

But, once its on the regular highway, be it city, county, state or federal, the vehicle had better have the proper papers and tags.
