Peace Corps To Hold Placement Test

Mill City area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 1:30 P. M. on Saturday, June 21 at Room 209 U. S. Postoffice, 150 Church st. N. E. The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive; an applicant can neither pass nor fail. Persons interested in serving with the Peace Corps must fill out an Application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before the test. Application forms are available from post offices or from the Peace Corps in Washington, D. C. 20525. Fifteen thousand Volunteers are currently serving in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Pacific Islands, working with the people of those nations in self-help projects ranging from food production to health to education. Detroit Ranger Station To Receive Bids

DETROIT—Sealed bids will be received by the District Ranger, Detroit, up to and not later than 10:00 A.M. June 30th for an estimated 500,000 board feet of federal timber on the timber sale. This is a sealed Southshore Thinning No. 2 bid sale with no oral auction. The sale involves 480 MBF of Douglas fir logs and peeler blocks at the advertised rate of \$50.00 per thousand, and 20 MBF of Western-hemlock and other coniferous species logs advertised at \$32.45 per thousand. Western-hemlock and other coniferous species will be sold at fixed rates as advertised. The stand of Willamette National Forest timber is located 3.6 miles Southwest of Detroit. This sale is being re-scheduled due to duplicate sealed bids being received at an earlier date.

Freres Veneer Successful Bidder at Recent Timber Sale

DETROIT—Freres Veneer, Lyons, was the apparent successful bidder on an estimated 5,800,000 board feet of federal timber on the Woodpecker No. 2 timber sale conducted at Detroit Ranger Station Thursday. There were five qualified bidders at the 10:00 A. M. oral sale. Douglas-fir logs and peeler blocks and Western hemlock and other coniferous species sold for \$90.20 per thousand respectively in the final bidding. The Douglas-fir advertised rate was \$85.90 and the Western Hemlock \$52.60 per thousand. Included in the sale was 168 acres of substandard timber in the sale area that sold at the advertised rate of \$2.50 per acre. The sale located about 14 miles East of Detroit

on Woodpeckers Ridge included, 3,300 MBF Douglas-fir peeler blocks and logs, an unestimated amount of Douglas-fir special cull logs and blocks and 2,500 MBF of western hemlock and other coniferous species. Douglas fir special cull logs and blocks sold at fixed rates. The auction included a second sale in the morning, the Whitewater Intermediate sale, with an estimated 2,000,000 board feet of Willamette National Forest timber which went to Freres Lumber Co. Inc., Lyons. There was three qualified bidders for this tract of timber. The 870 MBF of Douglas-fir logs and peeler blocks sold at the advertised rate of \$86.25 per thousand and 680 MBF Western hemlock and other coniferous species sold for \$52.10 per thousand, five cents more than the advertised rate. Other species of timber included in the sale was 300 MBF pine logs, 150 MBF Cedar logs and an unestimated amount of Douglas-fir special cull logs and blocks. Douglas-fir special cull logs, pine and cedar was sold at fixed rates. Included in the sale was 250 acres of substandard timber within the sale area which sold at the advertised rate of \$1.00 per acre. The sale is located about 12 miles East of Detroit adjacent to highway 22.

Forest Recreation Report Shows All Camp Grounds Open

DETROIT — The following Recreational report was released by Detroit Ranger Station this week.

Elk Lake Road is now open within 1000 feet of Elk Lake. All other roads and trails on the District remain the same as reported last week. All Forest Service campgrounds are open except Elk Lake.

L.W.C.F. went into effect June 15th at charge campgrounds. The two rule fire danger closure has been put into effect with the following requirements and restrictions.

Smoking is prohibited while traveling in timber, brush or grass areas. Smoking is also prohibited while working or traveling in an operation area. Have the following equipment for extinguishing fires when using camp-fires or other open fires, except when traveling as a pedestrian or camping at improved designated, or posted campgrounds.

Implements, one axe not less than 26 inches in length overall with head weighing two pounds or over; A shovel not less than 36 inches in length overall with blade not less than eight inches wide, and one water container capacity of one gallon or more.

Fishing is good in all the areas on the District and salmon is now being caught in the North Santiam River below the dam. The lower Breitenbush Hot Springs is open with cabins and hot mineral baths available.
