Mill City Man Injured Monday in Logging Accident

Richard Knutson, of Mill City 43, an employee of the Bill Pennick Logging Co. was injured about 11 a. m. Monday while working in the Clackamas watershed area 18 miles east of Detroit.

It was reported he was pinned between a power shovel and a log. He was taken to Santiam Memorial Hospital in Stayton and then transferred to the Salem Memorial Hospital, where he underwent surgery for internal injuries. Attendants reported he was in satisfactory condition.

Former Resident Accidentally Shot

Chris Evan Soelberg, 13, was shot accidentally at the home of a friend, on Sunday, May 25. The son of Mrs. Wanda J. Soelberg was pronounced dead at the scene by the Frederick County Medical Examiner.

Maryland State Police reported that Soelberg was visiting the home of Thomas W. Capino, 13, who lives at 15 West B Street in Brunswick. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas E. Capino.

The Capino youth told investigating officers that he had taken his father's .32 caliber automatic from a dresser drawer in a bedroom to show the victim.

The clip was inserted into the pistol and a cartridge was apparently lodged in the chamber and not withdrawn when the clip was removed. Capino said that the pistol accidentally discharged and Soelberg was struck in the chest with the bullet.

Tfc. Carl R. Harbaugh, who investigated the incident with Brunswick City Police, noted that no foul play was evident in the incident.

Surviving besides his mother are his father, Richard Byron Soelberg, his grandmother, Mrs. Ida M. Soelberg, of Portland, Ore., and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ruban Harrison of Brunswick, and two brothers, Nels Richard and Mark Allen, both at home.

Funeral services were conducted at the Feste Funeral Home, Rev. Ralph Miller officiating. Burial was in Park Heights Cemetery, Brunswick.

The Soelbergs are former area residents.

Breitenbush to Open Swimming Pool Soon

DETROIT — The following recreational project was released this week on the Detroit District by the Detroit Ranger Station.

Big Meadows road is now open and French Creek road is open to Halls Ridge. The road to Phantom Bridge is also open but there are a few large rocks in the road so motorists are cautioned to drive with care.

Stahlman Point Lookout trail is open giving the hiker a rewarding view of the Detroit Reservoir and surrounding mountains. Cheat Creek Trail No. 3441 is open to the junction Triangulation Trail No. 3373. Jefferson Park Trail No. 3373. Duffy Lake Trail No. 4327 is open to Duffy Lake, but a few snow drifts on the trail still remain. Some camping areas around the lake are open but there is still snow at the north end of the lake.

According to the report the high country is opening up quite rapidly. The report also says the swimming pool at the Upper Breitenbush Hot Springs Resort is scheduled to open the weekend of July 4th.

Trash Burning To Be On Limited Basis For This Season

Don Hutchinson, fire chief said this week that no permits for open burning would be issued anymore this season. Permits for burning in covered barrels or containers will be issued on a day to day basis from 10 A. M. to 4 P. M. only.

Permits may be obtained at 314 S. W. Second and 354 S. E. Grove. The Mid-Willamette Valley air pollution authority will enforce all rules and regulations regarding burning restrictions this year and instructions have been received here not to issue burning on days of High Air Pollution.

Community landfills and refuse disposal sites shall require authority approval on each open burning fire set before obtaining a fire permit from the local fire permit granting agency.

Marion Lake Boat Removal Delayed

DETROIT—It was announced last week that a U. S. Forest Service order for boat owners to remove their craft from Marion Lake in the Mt. Jefferson Primitive Area by Monday, June 30th, has been extended to Sept. 15th. Allen Priggs, assistant recreational director for the Willamette National Forest Service headquarters in Eugene, said the deadline for boat removal was extended by the U. S. Forest Service in Washington, D. C. because of pending legislation.

Inclusion of Marion and Ann Lakes in the Mt. Jefferson Primitive Area Act of Congress in 1968, required that all man-made facilities, including about 200 boats at Marion Lake, to be removed by June 30th. However the Willamette National Forest Service officials at Eugene recommended the extension after learning that Senators Mark O. Hatfield and Robert Packwood of Oregon planned to introduce a bill to eliminate the lakes from the primitive area requirements.

Boat Safety Courses Conducted Recently

DETROIT—Free boat safety instruction and inspections were conducted at Salem and Detroit Lake over the weekend by boat group members and Coast Guard officials.

Representatives of several Salem boating groups participated in the program at Wallace Marine Park in Salem.

Boat Safety literature was available and Coast Guard personnel made safety checks for those wishing them.

Members of Salem Flotilla 68 of the U. S. Coast Guard Auxiliary conducted safety tests at the Mongold ramp at Detroit Reservoir from 10:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Saturday and Sunday.

A basic seamanship course was held at 7:30 P.M. Saturday night at Detroit Lake State Park.
