Linn Intermediate Schools Receive \$576,913 Extra

Intermediate schools in Linn County will get an estimated \$25,38 per census child in the 1969-70 school year, William Dolmyer, superintendent of the Linn Benton District (IED) said today.

He said since most budgets are already made, the districts can hold the extra money as cash on hand or authorize the county treasurer, Evelyn Downing, to invest it for them until needed.

The money from federal forest funds is based on a record amount of stumpage and is distributed on a census basis, which includes persons 4 to 19 years old.

However, the money is distributed to elementary districts few of which have students under six years old and more than 13 years old, thus making the grant higher.

Dolmyer said the schools received \$16.92 per census child this year and were informed by the Forest Service that they could expect an estimated 50 percent more next year.

He noted that this is a sizeable increase since the county has 22,731 eligible persons, making the estimated total to be received some \$576,913.

The increase does not apply to Benton C. county, he said, which will receive an estimated \$3.75 per elementary child because it has fewer federal lands.

The distribution is made at one time, in September or October, he said.

He said another source of unexpected revenue was the collection of more than 100 per cent of taxes for the current year. This results from back taxes being paid and present tax collections continuing at a high rate.
