**Still Time To Apply For Tax Exemptions Says Assessor Byers**

Assessor Hal Byer of Linn County, today reminded property owners and taxpayers that the 1969 State Legislature passed a law providing, for this year only, that persons or firms who failed to apply for certain property tax exemptions for 1969-70 by the April 1 deadline may apply up to and including November 1, 1969.

Four classes of exemptions are involved; literary, benevolent and scientific institutions; disabled veterans and unmarried widows; commercial facilities under construction; and senior citizen residences.

The assessor suggests that any taxpayer who would be eligible to file under this special law make his application between now and August 15. This will enable the assessor to allow the exemption on the original assessment roll, which he starts preparing after that date.

In this way, extra trouble can be avoided for both the taxpayer and the assessor in correcting the roll after it is written, and make unnecessary a refund of taxes paid.

It is emphasized that a taxpayer must apply for the exemption. It will not be given automatically. Application blanks for filing can be obtained at the assessors office in the courthouse.

The assessor repeats that the extra time for applying is granted for this year only.

**County Road Projects Approved**

County road projects in Lane, Linn, Marion, and Willamette Counties were approved today by the Oregon State Highway Commission. Programmed funds for the five projects total \$1,635,000. The projects are eligible for the use of Federal-aid Secondary Highway Funds.

The proposed project in Lane County involves grading, draining, basing, paving and a structure on the River Road (Santa Clara) Interchange Section of the Belt Line Road (FAS 860). Project plans call for Belt Line Road to be paved the full width of 84 feet with asphalt concrete, with four 12-foot travel lanes, 10-foot shoulders, and a 16-foot median. The overpass structure is to be 170 feet long with a clear roadway of 84 feet. Other work involves rounded cutbanks, sight posts, guardrails and bases for light posts and conduits. The County is to make the survey and vicinity map and acquire the right-of-way. The State will make the plans and foundation tests.

Linn County's proposed project involves a structure, grading, drainage, curbing and paving on the South Santiam River (Sweet Home) Bridge Section of Pleasant Valley Road (FAS 217). Project plans call for constructing a 48-foot-wide bridge with five-foot sidewalks and its curbed approaches and connections. The new structure will be on improved alignment and is to be fully illuminated. The existing structure is to be removed and disposed of by the contractor. The State is to make the survey and plans and foundation tests.

Two projects are scheduled for Marion County. The first project involves 1.07 miles of grading, draining, curbing and paving on the Chemawa Road-Wheatland Road Section of North River Road (FAS 159). Plans for the proposed project call for paving with asphalt concrete a 68-foot curbed section for four 12-foot travel lanes, a 16-foot median, and a two-foot shy distance. Included are five-foot asphalt concrete footpaths. No parking will be allowed. The County is to acquire the right-of-way by resolution, and the State is to make survey and plans.

The second project in Marion County involves 0.76-mile of grading, draining, curbing and paving on the 99E-Ward Drive Section of Lancaster Drive (FAS 741). Project plans call for paving with asphalt concrete a 68-foot curbed roadway with five-foot asphalt concrete footpaths. This completes the portion of this route between State Street and US99E in Salem. The right-of-way was acquired by the County on the same resolution as the Ward Drive-Silverton Road Section. The State is to make survey and plans.

The project in Willamette County involves 1.87 miles of grading, draining, basing and surfacing on the Enterprise-Kooch Corner Section of Hurricane Creek Highway County Road (FAS 497). Project plans call for construction of two 12-foot travel lanes with eight-foot shoulders. Two concrete box culverts will be extended on both ends. No additional right-of-way is necessary. The State will make the survey and plans.

**Cardiovascular Council Has Been Formed**

Dr. William Cohen, president, Oregon Heart Association, announced that the American Heart Association has established a Council on Cardiovascular Nursing to disseminate reliable information in the field and help achieve the Association's objectives for improved patient care.

There are nine other Councils within the American Heart Association functioning as professional societies with specialty interests in the cardiovascular field. The other A.H.A. Councils cover arteriosclerosis, basic science, cardiovascular surgery, cerebrovascular disease, circulation and renal diseases, clinical cardiology, epidemiology, high blood pressure research, and rheumatic fever and congenital heart disease. "Twenty-one Oregon physicians are regular members of one or more of these councils," remarked Dr. Cohen.

The new Council on Cardiovascular Nursing is an outgrowth of the Heart Association's Committee on Nursing Education. The first business session of the Council will be held in Dallas on November 15, 1969 as part of a scheduled two-day Clinical Nursing Conference to be conducted in conjunction with the Association's annual Scientific Sessions.

Members of the new Council will be admitted without fee to the annual Clinical Nursing Conference. A \$25 registration fee will be charged to non-members. Members also will gain free admission to the Scientific Sessions. They will receive summary notes of

Council Annual Meetings, advance programs of Nursing Conferences and Scientific Sessions, as well as bulletins and other educational material. Members will be given preferential admission and reduced fees to postgraduate courses planned by the Council.

Since 1959, the American Heart Association has conducted programs on nursing education as part of its Scientific Sessions. A quarterly journal, Cardiovascular Nursing, to assist nurses in their understanding of heart and blood vessel diseases, and a variety of other educational material in the nursing area are available to Oregon nurses through the Oregon Heart Association. AHA sponsors "Three Days of Cardiology for Nurses" postgraduate courses in cooperation with the Oregon Heart Association and nursing divisions of universities and hospitals.
