A spokesman for weekly newspapers told the House Post Office Committee in Washington, that he accepts

Double check to be sure your driver's license is valid. If other family members are going to share the driving, check their licenses, too. Be sure you have the registration

certificate for your car and it is up to date.

It is a good idea to leave a copy of your vacation plans and your automobile license number with friends or neighbors in case of an emergency.

Advise the police when you are leaving and when you expect to return. Discontinue your newspaper. Publishers will be glad to make a vacation packet of your missed papers so you can catch up on local news when you return.

If you are going to be gone for a period of time, you may want to stop your mail delivery and put your telephone on vacation service.

Carrying your money in traveler's checks is a good idea. Your personal checkbook is safer than large amounts of cash.

Take care of your financial matters first so you can relax and enjoy your vacation.
