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Use Correct Canning Procedures

Be sure you are using the correct method when canning your fruits and vegetables, says Belva Covey, Linn County Extension agent.

It is not safe to can vegetables, meat, or poultry in a boiling-water bath, an oven, a steamer without pressure, or an open kettle. None of these methods will heat these products enough to kill the dangerous bacterial spores of Clostridium botulinum within a reasonable time.

There is no danger of botulism, however, if these foods are canned properly in a pressure canner. Be sure that the canner is in perfect order and that each step of the canning process including time and temperature directions—is followed exactly.

Tomatoes, pickled vegetables, and fruits can be processed safely in a boiling-water bath because they are more acid than other vegetables, meat, and poultry.

Unless you are absolutely sure of your pressure canner gage and canning methods, all home-canned meats should be boiled, as described below, after opening and before testing. Heating usually makes any odor of spoilage more noticeable.

Bring home-canned vegetables to a rolling boil, then cover and boil for at least 10 minutes. Boil spinach and corn 20 minutes. If the food looks spoiled, foams, or has an off odor, destroy it.

Boil home-canned meat or poultry 20 minutes in a covered pan before testing. If meat develops the characteristic odor of spoiled meat, destroy it without tasting.

Commercially canned foods are considered safe because they are processed under carefully controlled conditions. If a canned food shows any sign of spoilage—bulging can ends, leakage, spurting liquid, off-odor, or mold—do not use it. Do not even taste it.


Mrs. Jones passed away on Thursday in a Salem Nursing Home following a lengthy illness.


They who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength. (Isa. 40:31)

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First Seven Months of 1969 See Visitors Increase at Corps of Engineers Projects

Mostly fair weather during the month of July apparently brought an influx of visitors to Corps of Engineers' reservoirs in the Willamette Valley and at Bonneville and The Dalles Dams on the Columbia River, according to Col. Robert L. Bangert, Portland District Engineer.

The two Columbia River and 12 Willamette projects tallied 1,332,000 visitors during July of this year compared to 990,700 for July last year. Thus far this year 3,696,100 persons have visited these projects while during the first seven months of 1968 the total was 2,097,700.

Bonneville led the pack this July with 388,100 followed by Fern Ridge Reservoir near Eu-

gene with 325,200. Bonneville totaled 196,800 visitors in July 1968 and thus far this year has had 1,141,600 visitors. Fern Ridge was visited by 313,400 in July 1968. To date this year the project has been visited by 1,004,300 persons.

Other Willamette Valley reservoirs and their visitor attendance records for July 1969, July 1968, and their first seven months of this year are:

Cougar Reservoir near Blue River, 18,700, 23,500 and 52,800.
Green Peter and Foster Reservoirs near Foster, 74,600, 15,000 (estimated) and 208,100.
Hills Creek Reservoir near Oakridge, 30,300, 35,900 and 80,900.
Fall Creek Reservoir near Springfield, 69,100, 38,300 and 180,000.
Cottage Grove Reservoir near Cottage Grove, 91,500, 62,800 and 158,300.
Dorena Reservoir near Cottage Grove, 41,600, 44,700 and 101,200.
Lookout Point and Dexter Reservoirs near Lowell 93,000, 63,000 and 214,800.
Detroit and Big Cliff Reservoirs near Mill City, 115,100, 133,300 and 277,100.
At The Dalles Dam 86,900 visitors were counted in July of this year compared to 77,500 in July of last year. Total for the first seven months of this year stands at 277,000.

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


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
