Well Child Conf. To Be Held Thurs. At Detroit School

A well-child conference and immunization clinic will be held by the Marion County Health Department Thursday, October 30, at Detroit High School in Detroit. Hours will be 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Parents wishing to bring their children to be seen by the physician should make an appointment in advance by calling Mrs. Howard Drago area health chairman, Ph. 854-3522.

Well-child conference provide an opportunity for parents to consult with physician and public health nurse about the health status of their children. Immunizations for all ages are given at the clinics when indicated. No appointment necessary for immunizations only. Special emphasis is being focused on measles immunizations. If your child is one year old or over and has not had hard measles you are encouraged to have him immunized. Parents must accompany children requesting this service.

Medicare Folks To Pay First \$52 of Hospital Care

Medicare beneficiaries who enter the hospital after December 31, 1969 will be responsible for paying the first \$52 of their hospital expenses according to C. I. Flaten, district manager of the Salem Social Security office. Beneficiaries now pay the first \$44.

The increase results from a provision in the law requiring an annual review of hospital costs under Medicare and an adjustment of the portion of the hospital bill for which the beneficiary is responsible if these costs have risen substantially.

The hospital deductible amount, \$52 beginning in 1970, is equivalent to the average cost of one day of hospital care. If a Medicare beneficiary Hospital stay is no more than 60 days, Medicare pays the cost of all covered hospital services except for the deductible.

When a beneficiary has a hospital stay in excess of 60 days, he will pay \$13 a day for the 61st through the 90th day which is an increase of \$2 from the present \$11.

If he has a post-hospital stay of over 20 days in an extended care facility, he will pay \$6.50 per day.

For Medicare beneficiaries who enter a hospital before the end of this year, the hospital deductible will remain at the present \$44. Also, the costs for a hospital stay of over 60 days, or for post-hospital extended care, will stay at the present rate even though these services may be provided in 1970.

Summer Trout Season Ends, Winter Season Begins November 1

Oregon sport fishermen are reminded that Friday, October 31, marks the end of the general summer trout season. Beginning Saturday, November 1, and extending through the winter months, the more restrictive winter angling rules will be in effect.

Anglers will find the winter regulations in the rule book beginning on page 39. Fishermen will note that the winter regulations list only those waters which are open to angling. All waters not listed are closed. Most streams also have specific upstream deadlines above which anglers cannot fish.

Bag limits are also reduced. During the winter season anglers are allowed only 2 trout, steelhead, and salmon 12 inches or over in length per day. An exception is Zone 1, where the bag limit for salmon is 3 per day. The aggregate bag limit in Zone 1 is 3 such fish. Anglers are urged to check the winter rules carefully for bag limits, deadlines, and other regulations.

Some waters of the state remain open to year-round trout fishing and the regular summer bag limit applies. Winter trout angling, according to Game Commission fishery biologists, has become increasingly popular in recent years, especially when lakes or impoundments are frozen over to allow fishing through the ice.

Waters open to year-round trout fishing are found listed by zone in the general summer trout fishing section of the synopsis.

Doris Sheythe Attends Conference

Doris Sheythe, girls counselor and English teacher at Santiam High attended a reading conference sponsored by the state department on the campus of Pacific University at Forest Grove, October 22, 23, and 24. Emphasis was on reading and learning in the content areas in the secondary school.

Dr. E. Costen Frederick of the U. of Oregon and Dr. Ned Marksheffel of Oregon State University were two of the principal speakers. Both of these men pointed out the fact that the subject matter teacher has to teach reading too and that for a student to reach optimum learning in any area the materials must fit his level of reading. Dr. Joy Hills Gubser who is state director for elementary and secondary education ended the conference with the statement that she would like to see federal funds and any other funds available put into helping the students in grades 1, 2, and 3 so that many reading problems could be prevented and the remedial programs that are necessary now would be fewer.
