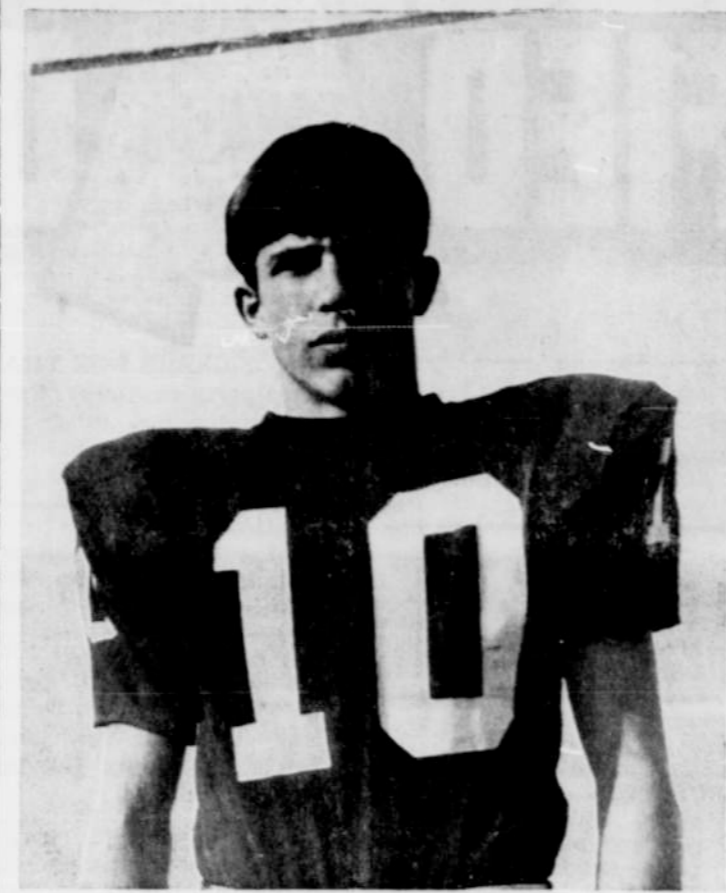

Larry Hillesland, Santiam's quarterback and end was named to the A-2 All State team. Hillesland, who was the minor division scoring leader with 42 points and top team scorer with a total of 52 points for the year, was picked by the A-2 grid coaches and sports writers for the All State first team. Hillesland was the Wolverine's leading pass receiver and doubled as quarterback for the running game. Besides being All State, Larry was chosen as split end and defensive halfback on the Capital

Conference All Star team. The only other player from the Capital Conference was quarterback Dave Woodmak, from Gladstone of the major division. Players from Stayton, Jefferson, Gladstone, and Woodburn made the second team and another player from Stayton made honorable mention.

Hillesland was the fourth player from Santiam to make the All State team in the last five years. Previous players were Randy Marshall in 1964, Dennis Davidson in 1966 and Bob Ward in 1967.

In making the announcement, Mrs. Wilson stated that she has appointed Mrs. James Fishman of Coos Bay, the American Legion Auxiliary Community Service Chairman, to assist her in heading the KAO fund drive activities.

"We feel very strongly that this fund drive for the Kidney Association of Oregon is extremely important," Mrs. Wilson said. "No amount is too small to be important and no amount could be too large to help our own Oregon people," Mrs. Wilson declared.

Mrs. Wilson pointed out that the way in which the fund drive is to be conducted in each city will be left up to the individual American Legion Auxiliary unit. Each unit, she said, has its own method of raising funds, since it is an integral part of each local community. She explained that some units may request individual donations, others may hold such events as candy sales, dances and dinners, while many units may work with various organizations in their communities to raise the money.

Bruce Stopper, KAO fund drive chairman, expressed his gratitude for the effort by the American Legion Auxiliary by saying that, "Their help and support is deeply appreciated in assisting us to reach our goal of \$150,000."

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
